### TO APPEASE WOOL GROWERS

#### Senators Would Place Woolen Fabrics on Free List.

Washington, D. C.—Fearful that they cannot restore raw wool to the dutiable list, Democratic senators from the wool-growing states are hopeful of appeasing the wrath of the wool men by making a fight to force wool fabrics and other woolen manufactures on the free list. They realize that this will not aid the wool growers, but there long has been a feeling among wool growers that the wool manufacturers were getting an advantage over them in tariff and if these senators can make wool fabrics free, in the event raw wool remains on the free list, they feel that they at least will have placed both industries on an equal footing, so that one enjoys no advantages of which the other is deprived.

For a great many years the wool manufacturers of the East have professed to work with the wool growers of the West in keeping a substantial duty on all forms of wool, both raw and manufactured. Yet the wool growers have known that the advantage has been on the side of the manufacturers and that the growers, especially under the Payne-Aldrich law, were only a fraction of the protection they were supposed to receive, owing to tricks of the manufacturers in grading foreign wools.

#### WARSHIP WORK IS SPEEDY

#### Big French Dreadnaught Laid in 1912 Is Launched.

L'Orient, France.—The super-dreadnaught Provence was successfully launched here Saturday. The rapid construction of the ship constitutes one of the most remarkable achievements in the French government dockyards. The order for the laying down of this ship was given in May, 1912, and the minister of marine has marked his appreciation by acceding one day's pay and half a day's vacation to all the men employed on its construction.

#### Prize Cow; 36 Quarts A Day

#### Butter Product For One Week Is 26.47 Pounds.

Wilkesbarre, Pa.—William D. Robinson, a farmer near here, has the prize cow of Pennsylvania. Her supply of milk is so great that the State College of Agriculture has taken her record as a subject of analysis, and it is declared that she is the greatest butter producer in the country.

#### Professor Painter, of the State College, who made a study of the cow's production of milk, found that she gave 536 pounds of milk in a week, or an average of more than 36 quarts for each of the seven days she was under test.

#### This milk produced 26.47 pounds of butter, and at the average market price of 40 cents a pound, her yield is worth nearly \$11 a week.

#### The cow is not yet five years old, and is declared to be the finest specimen of Alderney in the state.

#### Hope Outlives Faith and Charity.

Greenwich, Conn.—The death here of Mrs. Hope Trower Alcorn, the last of triplets born in England 80 years ago and named Faith, Hope and Charity, is announced. Charity lived to be only 52 years old. Faith died at the age of 74. The three were born in Hereford, Sussex county, England, in 1832. Faith and Charity never married, but Hope became the bride of Charles Alcorn in 1852 and came with him and their two children to America and settled in Greenwich, where five more children were born to them.

#### Sunday Opening Favored.

Washington, D. C.—The 22d annual congress of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution adjourned sine die, after a week's session. Mrs. William Cummings Story, of New York, was elected president-general. One of the most important actions of the concluding session was the adoption of a resolution declaring it was the sense of the congress that it was desirable that George Washington's home at Mount Vernon, Va., should be opened to the public every Sunday for a few hours.

#### Three Killed at Panama.

Panama—A premature explosion of dynamite occurred on the canal Monday, in which three men were killed and 23 injured. Dynamite to the amount of about 21,000 pounds, filling 96 drill holes, "let go" from some unknown cause. The electric wires were not attached and the only possible explanation seems to be that a sulphur formation at this point had generated heat. The explosion occurred just as everything was ready for the blast.

#### Stroke Sequel of Flight.

London—Sir Charles Day Rose, M. P., president of the Royal Aero club, yachtsman and breeder of race horses, died here Sunday with tragic suddenness. He had made his first flight as a passenger in an aeroplane at Hendon and was delighted with his novel experience. On his way to his home in a motor car he died from heart failure.

#### Aviator's Passenger Killed.

Turin—During a military aviation competition here Saturday the benzine tank of the aeroplane piloted by Stavros exploded. The aviator had a passenger named Sallo aboard. Sallo was burned to death and the aviator was seriously injured.

# SCUTARI YIELDS TO MONTENEGRO

## Fighting Forced Before Powers Can Deliver Note.

Exhausted Garrison Said to Have Yielded to Beseegers—Bulgaria and Greece at Outs.

Cettinje—It is officially announced here that the Montenegrin forces have entered Scutari.

London—Pending the conclusion of a formal armistice, covering the operations of all the allies, the Montenegrins are renewing their desperate efforts to capture Scutari, the fall of which, according to an official report issued at Cettinje, is imminent.

There is no confirmation of the story from Trieste that, owing to the exhaustion of food, the commander of Scutari is endeavoring to negotiate for its surrender, but a Belgrade dispatch says the Montenegrins have heavy artillery before Scutari and have employed it in their present attack, although the Serbian troops are leaving or have left that district.

It is said that Montenegro is endeavoring to arrange with Serbia for the purchase of this artillery.

It is supposed that the Montenegrin government has closed the frontier and suspended postal and telegraph service in order to prevent any interference on the part of the powers until Scutari falls.

It is said that the King of Montenegro has granted permission for all the Albanian refugees to leave Scutari.

A report published at Bucharest says that, under the settlement arranged at St. Petersburg, Roumania will receive Siliustria with about two miles of territory around the town and the right to erect fortifications.

Bulgaria and Greece are rapidly drifting towards war over the possession of Saloniki, according to the Chronicle's correspondent at that town.

The Greeks have mobilized every available soldier and concentrated one army in the neighborhood of Saloniki, while another is being landed at Orfani, in the Gulf of Orfani, in order to watch the movements of the Bulgarians at Drama and Kavala. The victorious Epirus army from Janina is being distributed along the new strategic front from Saloniki to Orfani.

#### CANAL MAY OPEN THIS YEAR

#### If Slides Do Not Interfere, Fram May Be First Boat Through.

Washington, D. C.—Colonel Goethals, chief engineer of the Panama canal, in a report to the War department, reiterates the hope he expressed some time ago that he would pass a ship through the canal before the close of the present year. The statement came in response to an inquiry from Secretary Garrison as to whether it would be possible to grant the request of Captain Knud Amundsen, the explorer, that he be allowed to take his ship Fram through the canal when he starts for the Arctic regions next winter. Colonel Goethals said:

"The opening of the Panama canal for the passage of vessels has always been predicated on the question of slides and the completion of the lock gates. The present schedule contemplates admitting the water into Culabra cut early in October and the completion of one flight of locks at either end of the canal by that same date. The passage of boats to these heights upon the condition of the slides."

"It is hoped that we will be able to pass a ship before the close of the year, and if this can be accomplished, the Fram will have no difficulty in making the transit of the canal, and every facility will be offered for its doing so. No assurance, however, can be given at this time."

#### Hop Sings Threaten War.

San Francisco—A new angle was thrown on the Chinese tong war here when the Hop Sing Tong served notice that unless the two warring tongs, the Suey Sings and Bing Kongs, came to a speedy agreement it, too, would take to fighting. This action by the Hop Sings is the outcome of a blockade placed around Chinatown by the police in an effort to stop tong murders that have been frequent lately, by hurting the business of the merchants, who, police say, are supporting the tongs. The police continue their blockade.

#### End of Siege Ordered.

Antivari, Montenegro—An ultimatum was sent to Montenegro by the commander of the international fleet blockading the coast. It declares that unless Montenegro immediately withdraws her troops from Scutari the fleet will land troops at Antivari, Dulcigno and San Giovanni de Medua. The reply to the Balkan allies is a general acceptance of the offer of mediation between Turkey and the allies, with the questions of the disposal of the islands in the Aegean sea left open for debate with the powers.

#### Bill in Form as Vetted.

Washington, D. C.—The sundry appropriation bill in the identical form in which it was vetted by President Taft in the closing hours of the last congress was brought up in the house Wednesday, but reading and action were deferred until a later date. The measure was taken up under special rule to expedite it through the house. It carries \$116,000,000 for various expenses of the government in the next fiscal year.

#### One Firm Bids to Build Tender.

Washington, D. C.—The New York Shipbuilding company, of Camden, N. J., was the only bidder for the contract to build the destroyer tender Melville, a vessel of a new type in the American navy. The ship is to be a floating machine shop and supply ship combined, of 7150 tons displacement. The bid for construction without plant was \$1,260,000 and for the ship with repair equipment, \$1,310,000.

### USE SNAKES TO KILL SNAKES

South America Has Discovered an Excellent Way to Cope With the Universal Pest.

In South America, where the snake pest is a very serious proposition, they are now using snakes to catch snakes.

Even in the most civilized parts of Brazil over 1,000 persons are killed annually by snake bite.

The mongoose, which proved so effective in Jamaica and elsewhere, is of little use here. Mongoose is the mother of invention, and nature and science together have at last discovered something which it is hoped may eventually exterminate the dreadful pest.

The discovery is nothing else than a "beneficial" snake which is harmless to man, and which kills and eats the poisonous species.

The murrina, as it is called, is a thick, muscular snake about four feet long. It is possessed of an insatiable appetite for poisonous vipers, and it can tell of the approach of one in the same way that a pointer will "scent" game. When tracking its prey, which is frequently considerably bigger than itself, the "good" snake assumes a lethargic air as if it were glutted with food and could not fight. Seeing this the bad snake immediately attacks.

This is just what the other wants; for, being rendered by nature completely immune from the poison, it seizes its enemy before it has had time to recover from the charge, and gives a fatal bite at the base of the brain.

Images of Hindu gods and Buddha have been discovered at Dhalaogon near Rampal, India, formerly the capital of King Ballal Sen. Two months ago an astrologer of Ranchashar, Munshiganj, is said to have predicted that there lay hidden treasures in a puca building underneath a tank.

With the permission of the owner and the government, the tank is being bailed out by him. As a result, the images were recovered and traces of buildings found.

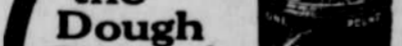

The most notable case was probably that of the great and good man, Rev. T. Bowdler, D. D., who by publishing a "family edition" of Shakespeare in 1811, added the words "bowdlerize" and "bowdlerism" to our language.—Exchange.
