A LETTER TO THE TEACHERS

To the Teachers of Wasco County.

DEAR TEACHERS: Complaint is made to this office that the compulsory education law is not being impartially enforced; that in some cases children are reported and in others not. It seems to make some difference whose children they are.

The law requires teachers, principals, superintendents and school officers to aid in the enforcement of this law, and they are any of them liable to a fine for failing to do so.

Require children to bring excuses for absences. Eight unexcused half-day absences constitute irregular attendance and such pupils should be reported at once.

Blanks for your use are furnished. Report at once any pupil between the age of eight and fifteen years who is in irregular attendance at school in your district. There is one truant officer for the entire county.
