**HUNTERS KILL COUGAR**

Last Monday afternoon Fred Evans and Elmer Davidhizar brought to town a cougar which they had killed that morning on the Root place, about a mile and a half from Mosier. The animal was evidently a young one, measuring 6 feet, 6 inches from tip to tip and weighing 106 pounds.

The big cat had been taking toll from a bunch of goats belonging to Mr. Root, killing three recently, the last victim being killed Sunday night or early Monday morning.

Mr. Davidhizar, who lives on the Root place, discovered where the goat had been killed and tracked the cougar by the blood and the trail made by dragging the carcass thru the brush. The brute had jumped a fence with his prey and had buried it, evidently intending to return later and "get his goat."

Mr. Davidhizar phoned over to Fred Evans to get his dogs and strike the trail of the long-tailed marauder, which was done, and in a very short time the cougar was located in a tree, from which Mr. Evans brought him down with a well directed shot in the head.

This is probably one of a family of cats which have discovered that Mosier district is a good place to get an easy living. Some time ago Wm. Wright saw a cougar in the road, in the same neighborhood where this was killed Monday, and it, or another one, has been seen once since and heard several times, and one night last winter a big animal, supposed to have been a cougar, called at S. F. Goss's hen house, on the edge of town, and even went up onto the porch of the house.

There is a bounty of \$10 on cougars and Mr. Evans shipped his "kill" to The Dalles, where he "cashed in." The animal was returned to him, after being properly marked by the county officials, and he will have the skin made into a rug.

TO THE TEACHERS: The following plan will govern in the eighth grade examination in Agriculture:
