BIG MASS MEETING TO BE HELD HERE

Mosier Citizens Will Meet Monday Night to Discuss Questions of Incorporating.

A mass meeting of the citizens of Mosier will be held in Chown's Hall, next Monday night, to discuss the question of incorporating the town.

The Rev. J. R. Hargreaves, of Hood River, will be the main speaker, supplemented by several local speakers, who will strive to show the benefits to be derived from incorporating, and the wisdom of such a move.

As progress and prosperity are synonymous, and as the majority of Mosier's citizens are progressive and naturally wish to be prosperous, it is not necessary to urge this particular class to attend this meeting.

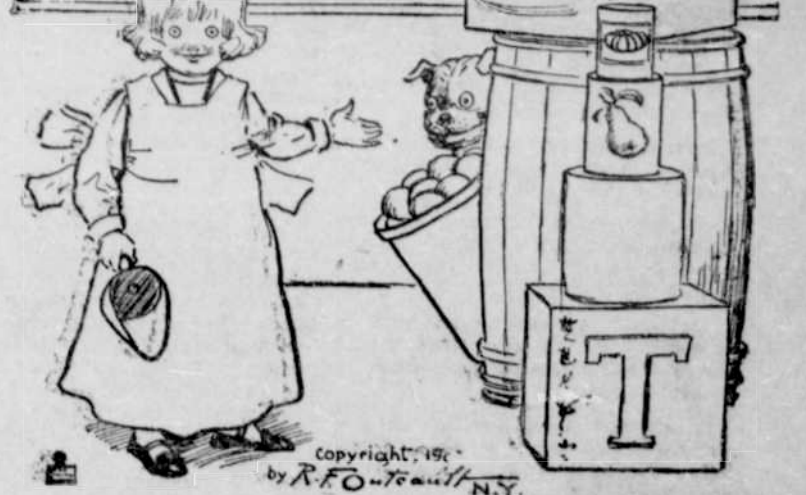
