The reason being that the city passed from the old regime of the Rushlight machine, which has held the reins of government for the past two years, into the hands of H. R. Albee, who, together with four new Commissioners, have pledged themselves to conduct the city's affairs with the utmost zeal and intelligence—always striving to do that which is best for the welfare of the city.

Mr. Albee will assume his duties as the city's chief-executive on July 1st, and is elected for four years, his salary being \$6000 a year. Each of the four Commissioners receive \$5000 a year.
