The annual school meeting, held at the school house Monday afternoon, resulted in the election of the following officers: F. G. Powers, to succeed C. G. Stoltz, director, and C. A. Brown as clerk for the coming year.

At the annual school meeting of this district, held last Monday, J. E. Higley was elected director and J. P. Ross clerk. In No. 8 District, Mrs. Zella Davidhizar was elected a director, to succeed her husband, Elmer Davidhizar, who was elected clerk. Mrs. Davidhizar has the distinction of being the first woman to be elected on a school board in this part of the county.

In The Dalles, Mrs. W. A. Bell, wife of the District Attorney, was elected as a director, over A. E. Crosby by 110 votes.

When the county court made a re-division of the voting precincts of the county, it divided Mosier Precinct, the line of division being a line thru the main street of Mosier. This line, extended on south several miles, divides the Mosier Precinct into East Mosier and West Mosier. Hereafter, in all county elections there will be two polling places, both situated in the town of Mosier. According to the law, a voter must register in the precinct in which he lives, or with the county clerk. The county clerk has recently appointed J. E. Cole Registrar for West Mosier precinct, and H. G. Kibbee Registrar for East Mosier. The registration books and blanks have been received and in a short time the registration books will open permanently, or until 30 days prior to any general election. According to the new law, when a voter now registers, he is given a registration certificate which he preserves and which is his "passport" to all future elections without registration, so long as he maintains his residence in the precinct in which he is registered.

J. K. McGregor is having the old Higley house, which he recently purchased, moved onto his lot on the corner above the hotel. The building will be remodeled and used for—we don't know what, as Jack hasn't told us.
