TO START WORK ON SCENIC ROAD

The Hood River News says that work on the Hood River road will begin at the word of the county commissioners of Multnomah county, according to the report of Road Supervisor Chapman, filed recently.

The road will be 42 miles in length in Multnomah county, from the court house in Portland to the county line. Two and a half miles of road from Bridal Veil east to the first encroachment on the O-W. R. & N. right of way have been completed at a cost of \$8,709.

The five mile stretch from Rooster Rock to Bridal Veil it is estimated will cost \$25,000. The contract with the O-W. R. & N. has done away with two heavy grades, one of 19 per cent for 1000 feet and the other of 17 per cent for the same distance.

It has reduced these grades to a grade of not over 5 per cent. The contract has also done away with two overhead crossings and 1000 feet of trestle at Oneonta gorge.

TAXES IN ADVANCE

Incorporated in the laws passed by the last legislature is a provision that the county assessor must collect taxes in advance on personal property in such cases where his judgment tells him that there is likelihood that the assessment might become delinquent by the non-residence of the owner at the time payment of taxes becomes due--says The state tax commission has ordered County Assessor J. A. Davis to take up this matter and within the next few days he will start out to secure the taxes that thus become due to the county.

The fact that onions from Texas, potatoes from California and eggs and poultry from points outside of Oregon are being received in Portland in carload lots while the farmers in the immediate vicinity of the city, as well as those tributary to the railroads leading to this market, can not find a market for their produce at any price, has led the Portland Realty Board to actively take up the question of establishing public markets where gardeners and farmers may dispose of their products direct to the consumer with great benefit to both.

Twohy Brothers construction crew, which has been working on the double tracking just west of The Dalles, has moved its headquarters to Mosier and it is rumored that the work to be done here and west of town will occupy about a year. Report

has it that a number of changes will be made in the local tracks and the location of the depot, and that the long trestle between Mosier and Hood River will be filled in; also that they will finish the road up Rock Creek for the rock crusher.

NOTICE

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

The following is a copy of Notice that will be served upon you by your Road Supervisor if you have upon your premises any of the noxious weeds named in the section following:

You are hereby notified to remove said noxious weed from said premises within ten days of the date of the service of this notice upon you, and if the same is not so removed the undersigned will immediately proceed in relation thereto as is provided in Chapter 394, in the session laws of 1913 of the State of Oregon. Section 6464 thereof is as follows:

Section 6464. If any person, persons or corporation owners, possessing or having care or charge of any land or lands, improved or unimproved, enclosed or unenclosed, in this State, shall knowingly permit or suffer any Russian thistle, Canada thistle or Chinese thistle or sisymbrium altissimum (called white or Jim Hill mustard), cocklebur (known as the dagger cocklebur), atriplex argentea (called the silver salt bush), to grow up thereon, or upon a road or highway adjoining said lands, and suffer the same to stand until its bloom falls or its seeds begin to form, such person, persons or corporation shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall, for the first offense, be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, and for the second and each subsequent offense not less than \$25 nor more than \$100, said fines to be recovered, with costs, in an action to be brought in the name of the State of Oregon, for the use and benefit of the general fund of the county where the offense is committed, and such person, persons or corporation shall also be liable for all damages sustained by the neighboring land owners resulting from such neglect on the part of such person, persons or corporation to extirpate and destroy such noxious weeds before the same shall mature, to be recovered in an action at law in the Circuit Court of the county where such lands are located. Justices of the Peace shall have jurisdiction of this offense.

This weed has attained a large growth in this locality and a similar notice to this is being served upon all persons upon whose land the same is growing, and an immediate compliance with this notice will be of great benefit and save you further costs and trouble.

The County Court of this County has furnished the Road Supervisors of the various Districts of the County with copies of the above described Notice, with instructions to serve a copy upon all parties that have all or any of the noxious weeds upon their premises as described and named in the above Section 6464, and the Court stands back of the Supervisors in the enforcement of this law.
