At present the mouth of creek points up the river, due to the circuitous course of the creek and the constant changing of the channel by the high water and drifting sands. Owing to this peculiar condition, very few large fish find their way into the creek, which deprives fishers of much sport that is enjoyed in almost all the other tributaries of the Columbia. Mr. Fritz expressed the opinion that the creek could be straightened at comparatively small expense.
