W. A. Firebaugh, of Portland and Ortley, met with a most unfortunate accident at St. Helens, last Friday, when a huge timber which was being loaded onto a truck, was thrown sideways by a wheel of the truck breaking thru the planking of the St. Helens Mill Co.'s dock. The timber, weighing 7500 pounds, struck Mr. Firebaugh's leg, crushing it to a pulp. He was hurried to Good Samaritan Hospital, where it was found necessary to amputate the limb above the knee.

She lived but a few minutes.
