PLANNING A ROBBERY.

This London Thief Was Quite Deliberate in His Preparations.

DAINTY COBWEBS.

How Spiders' Fine Spun Threads Compare With Human Hair.

It is hard to realize how small a spider's web really is. A famous microscopist once made some interesting comparisons of a cobweb with human hair.

"I have often compared the size of the thread spun by full grown spiders with a hair of my beard," he says. "I placed the thickest part of the hair before the microscope, and from the most accurate judgment I could form, more than 100 of the spider's threads placed side by side could not equal the diameter of one such hair. If, then, we suppose such a hair to be of a round form it follows that 10,000 threads spun by the full grown spider, when taken together, will not be equal in substance to the size of a single hair.

To this, if we add that 400 young spiders at the time when they begin to spin their webs are not larger than one full grown one and that each of these minute spiders possesses the same organs as the larger ones, it follows that the exceedingly small threads spun by these little creatures must be still 400 times slender, and consequently that 400,000 of these minute spiders' threads cannot equal in substance the size of a single hair.

DRESSING FOR ROYALTY.

The Proper Capar When One Is Invited to Windsor Castle.

Those who are invited to spend a few days with the king at Windsor are sometimes apt to be rather overcome by the grandeur they find, and an excess of shyness, something like stage fright, is in some cases the inevitable accompaniment of the first evening at the castle.

In Queen Victoria's time guests were bidden only to "dine and sleep." Therefore all they saw of their royal hosts was comprised in a few moments' conversation in the drawing room after dinner unless they happened to be near the queen at the dinner table.

This is all altered now. Guests are bidden to stop two or three days and consequently see much more of the king and queen than in former times. The question of dress always is a great problem with the ladies "commanded" to Windsor castle, for, instead of acquiring only one smart evening toilet and suitable jewels for a "dine and sleep" visit of one night, quite an outfit must be laid in for three or four days' stay. No particular dress is required on arrival, as guests are shown at once to their rooms, but next morning it is necessary to appear rather smartly dressed for breakfast, which is quite a formal meal at the castle.

Then another change of toilet is required when the time comes to join the shooters at luncheon and yet another on returning to the castle for 5 o'clock tea. Every night, too, a different toilet must be worn, suitable to the royal surroundings and proportionately expensive.—London Answers.

The Habitué of Devils.
Captain C. H. Stigand has written a book about the tribes of British East Africa in "The Land of Zinj." Referring to Mount Kenya, whose summit was reached by the Mackinder expedition, he says that the natives "believe that the upper slopes are the habitat of devils and all kinds of evil spirits. I am told that natives who have returned from the upper slopes are not at liberty to speak about what they have seen. The idea is that they have been let off by the demons of the mountains, but if they boast about it some evil will befall them, or the evil spirits will avenge themselves."

TRINIDAD'S ASPHALT LAKE.

One of the World's Hot Spots, Torrid, Desolating and Enervating.

In "The Path of the Conquistadores" London Bates, Jr., tells of the famous asphalt lake of Trinidad. He says:

"The struggling village at the edge of the extraordinary spectacle. Not a house but is twisted out of plumb. The mud is the source of never ceasing illness, because the slowly shifting currents of the pitch bottom in a few years move yards and gardens on to other men's property, distort boundaries into every possible shape, carry landmarks a hundred yards away.

"The abandonment of desolation is the rage. In spots a palm killed by the asphalt droops despondently. A few tufts of grass here secured a footing in places. But for the rest it is a solid mass of black, dull, evil smelling pitch, with pools of water here and there, in which swim little arborescent fishes. Against any of the hot spots in the world, bar none, this can be looked.

"A wicked looking blackness six or seven inches into the bushes near the margin of the lake. It has been burning itself on the asphalt. No wonder the serpents are supposed to be creatures of the devil. As for myself, from minutes' stay takes away every bit of vitality we can summon. Not enough interest is left in life to inquire what the negroes heaving with nature at the asphalt receive in wages they earn the pay, whatever it is.

"The lake is ninety to a hundred acres in extent now, but it is gradually shrinking with the removal of the enormous quantities that have been taken out."
