Mrs. Margaret Emma Harvey, wife of J. W. Harvey, died at the hospital in Pendleton last Monday, Aug. 25th, of tuberculosis of the stomach. The body was brought to Mosier on Tuesday for interment in Odd Fellows Cemetery. Deceased leaves a husband and three children—Clinton, living at Walla Walla, Clay, and Mrs. Edith Foord, who, with their father, live at Umatilla. Another son, Edward, met an accidental death in Mosier some five years ago.

Mrs. Harvey was born in Linn county March 4, 1857. The funeral services were conducted at the grave by Rev. H. C. Clark. Accompanying the remains were the husband, J. W. Harvey, a son, Clay, and the daughter, Mrs. Edith Foord, and her husband, and Mrs. W. G. Armsworthy, a relative from Wasco.

MRS. J. P. CARROLL PASSES

Mrs. Maria Jane Carroll died at her home near Mosier, at 10 o'clock Sunday morning, August 24. Her maiden name was Gordon, and she was born in Hardin Co., Ky., Nov. 3, 1834. In 1840 she went with her parents to Ohio. She was married to James Craft in 1853. To them were born three children: Alva, who lives at Forest Grove; Michael, who lives at Dee, and Mrs. Anna Yarnell, living at Portland. Mr. Craft went into the army and died in 1862.

In November, 1867, she was married to James P. Carroll, and to him she bore three children, George and John, who live here, and Frank, who died in infancy. The Carrolls moved to Kansas in 1883, and in 1893 came to Oregon, and have lived in this vicinity since. They have lived on their present fruit ranch for 18 years.

The deceased became a Christian when about 16 years old, and was a member of the Baptist Church, with her husband, until 4 years ago, when she united with the Mosier Christian Church. Hers has been a true, quiet, consistent Christian life, which yet liveth.

The funeral services were held at the Christian Church, conducted by her minister, H. C. Clark, and attended by many sorrowing relatives and friends. Many from out of town were present. The floral offerings were beautiful.

The body was laid to rest in Odd Fellows Cemetery. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the bereaved family.
