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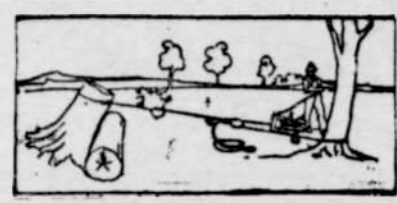

American Foresters to Help Palestine
That the successful work of American foresters in their own country has attracted wide attention is shown by the fact that an agricultural colony in Palestine has just applied to the United States Forest Service for help in planting trees to bind the drifting sands of the Mediterranean. The colony is near Jaffa, or Yafa, the ancient Joppa of the Bible, and there is being developed in connection with it a seaside resort, with hotel, villas, both houses and gardens.

The reclamation of sand dunes is not a serious problem in the eastern United States, because the prevailing winds are from the land and the sand is blown into the sea. On the west coast the situation is more serious. The most notable example of reclaimed sand areas there is furnished by Golden Gate Park, San Francisco, where grasses, acacias and later trees and shrubs, have converted sand wastes into pleasure-grounds of great beauty, and what has been done in San Francisco may, presumably, be done at Jaffa.

Another instance of reclamation may be seen at Landes, France, where a wealth-producing forest of maritime pine, the source of the French turpentine, has been grown to take the place of shifting dunes. The American foresters also give the address of the French seedsman who furnished the government with the maritime pine seed which has been used in planting experiments on Florida, national forest, near the Gulf coast.
