NEW APPLE GRADER

Ed L. Howe, owner of "Le-howa," one of the best kept and best paying fruit orchards in the Mosier District, and probably in any other district in the West, is something of an inventor and an originator of many ingenious devices which he has perfected and put to practical use on his farm.

Mr. Howe says he got the foundation of his idea for the apple grader from the Thomas E. Avery grader, at Hood River, but the rest of it he worked out himself, and he considers it superior to anything of the kind he has seen.

Each section is provided with three canvas-bottom bins. The upper bin receives the extra fancy fruit, in the next lower are placed the fancy apples, the third bin, or tray, receives the choice grade, while the culls or seider apples are put into a box which stands underneath on the floor.

The idea which Mr. Howe has carried out to perfection, at any rate to his satisfaction, results in a grader which proves efficient, is reasonably compact, can be operated with the smallest fraction of "lost motion," and can be built at a minimum cost.

Mr. Howe is justly proud of his invention, as he is of his new packing house. But that is "another story" which will appear later, suffice it to say that it is probably the most complete and convenient private building of its kind in the country.

MOSIER APPLES UNEXCELLED

One of our prominent apple growers received this week a letter from a well known and successful apple grower of Hood River, in which he eulogizes Mosier apples, stating that they were better than any he "ever saw in Hood River, or anywhere else."

SCHOOL NOTES

The Mosier school opened last Monday morning with Prof. E. M. Ulmer, of Valparaiso University, Ind., in charge of the High School department, with an enrollment of 10—four in first year and six in third year.

Indications point to a very efficient and successful school year. All the pupils are entering into their work with a vim.

We expect to organize the athletics by next week. Tennis and basketball are to be the main features.

The seventh and eighth grades are showing an active spirit in their work, under the excellent direction of Mr. J. P. Ross. The enrollment in these grades is 11.

The Intermediate grades are leading out with an enrollment of 35, under the leadership of Miss Dorothy A. Little, of Minneapolis, Minn.

The Primary department easily compares with the other departments, with an enrollment of 25, under the direction of Miss Alice Bennett, of Wisconsin, whose competency in the work only needs to be seen to affirm the good choice of the Mosier School Board and the good fortune of the patrons of the school.

A school bulletin will be issued each week and published in the local paper. The editors are Emily Husbands, Robert Scarse and Ed Sturgess.

An effort will be made to interest the business men and others of the community in the welfare of the school. They will be asked to give 15 minute talks to the pupils on subjects of their own choosing which will interest and instruct the school. This will tend to stimulate the interest of the entire community in the school, the teachers and the pupils.
