## SLAVERY IS RIFE IN PHILIPPINES

Borah Says Situation Demands Action by Congress.

Washington, D. C.—At the first favorable opportunity, Senator Borah, of Idaho, will lay before the senate documentary proof of his charge that slavery and peonage exist, to a large degree, in the Philippine islands and, based on that evidence, he will ask congress so to legislate as to wipe out these two practices. Slavery and peonage in the Philippine islands are now prohibited under the terms of the Philippine government bill, passed by congress July 1, 1902, but that act provides no penalties and makes no provision for the enforcement of the law.

Some time ago the senate, on motion of Senator Borah, called upon the secretary of War to furnish any evidence in the files of his department as to the existence of slavery and peonage in the Philippines. The secretary's reply, written in the bureau of insular affairs, conveyed the impression that there was neither slavery nor peonage in the islands. Senator Borah has evidence that native children and women and occasionally men, are sold and held as slaves or peons, and in that condition are often brutally treated by their virtual owners. His chief reliance, however, is on a report written by Dean C. Worcester, secretary of the Philippines, April 30, which is replete with evidence substantiating the charges.

After citing innumerable cases, giving names, dates and particulars, Secretary Worcester concludes this report, saying:

"Negritos, Infuagoes, Manobos, Tagbanuas, Moros and Filipinos have been captured by armed men, who in order to obtain them, killed their parents or other natural defenders, and have subsequently been sold as chattels and compelled to render services for which they receive not a cent."

"Members of the above-mentioned tribes, as well as Christian Filipinos, have been kidnaped and subsequently sold, held and required to render services as above."

"Filipino slaves have been shipped to China. Filipino school children have been secretly enticed from their homes by false promises of education and remuneration and have been sold into slavery and peonage."

"While there has been much noise about slavery, there has been profound silence relative to peonage, which, in the Philippines, is by far the greater evil of the two, because of the large number of persons who suffer from its prevalence."

"The report of Secretary Worcester shows that natives of the Philippine islands are often sold for as little as \$1.50, American money, and the average price paid for slaves is only a few dollars, in rare cases a price of \$150 having been paid. In most instances the slaves are held as household servants, though some of the more comely women are handled as are the white slaves in more civilized countries."

One common method of obtaining slaves is to negotiate with Negritos, savages of low mentality, for as many slaves as may be desired. The Negritos make a raid on the town of some enemy, capture the children or women and turn them over to the slave-traders. These Negritos will take the children from their own people, if they want the cash, and commonly will get the parents intoxicated with vino and buy their children from them while they are drunk. Other natives have been found selling their children to procure food for themselves, when they happen to be in particularly destitute circumstances.

"When they are starving," says Secretary Worcester, "it is comparatively easy to buy their children. Under such circumstances, of course, normally known Negrito girls of marriageable age to be purchased for rice worth \$1.50 gold."

## Convicts Thank Governor.

Olympia, Wash.—In a letter to the 30 members of his "honor camp" of convicts on Hood's canal, Governor Lister promises to extend the system if the experiment is successful. Governor Lister, on his return from a brief vacation on Mount Rainier, found a personal letter of thanks signed by all 30 members of the honor camp, who said: "We desire to assure you of our determination to carry out every promise we have made you and demonstrate that your confidence in us has not been misplaced."

## Arctic "Snowbird" to Wed.

New York—There reached here from St. Johns, N. Y., Monday the report of the engagement of Miss Marie Peary, daughter of Rear Admiral Peary, to Donald MacMillan, who accompanied Peary in the dash to the pole. Miss Peary is the "snowbird" of the Esquimaux, who bestowed that title upon her shortly after her birth farther north than any white child in the world, her mother being the first white woman to winter with an Arctic expedition. MacMillan started this year for the Far North.

## "Shoot to Kill," Is Order.

Chicago—Chief of Police McWeeny has detailed 26 men to make war on holdup men, in the hope of averting the wave of crime which has made its appearance in Chicago each October for many years. The chief's instructions were: "Shoot to kill if necessary. There never must be such another state of affairs as existed last winter, and the time to prevent it is before it starts."

## BRITISH ACTIVE IN COLOMBIA

Acquire Concessions Contrary to Monroe Doctrine.

Right to Build Waterways Alarms U. S.—Situation Same as Japanese at Magdalena Bay.

Washington, D. C.—The report that Pearson & Son, the great English firm of contractors and exploiters, with its significant relations to the British government itself, had obtained a gigantic concession for the exploitation of Colombia's natural resources, involving the right to construct docks, quays, railways and canals, arouses intense interest, not to say keen concern, here.

The latter involves the acquisition by English concessionaries of tracts of land and harbor works in the gulf of Darien, a stone's throw from the Panama canal, and special interests along the Atrato river, a waterway which forms a part of the site of the Colombian route for an Isthmian canal.

The details of the concession, which was procured for Pearson & Son by Lord Murray, formerly chief whip of the Liberal party, are understood here to be along the lines of a concession proposed some months ago, and if, indeed, they are the same, the State department had good cause to worry. The department, it is said, will institute an immediate investigation.

For several years it has been watching the situation, and with some of the department's experts the subject has been considered one of great diplomatic and strategic importance. If it proves, as is asserted, that Lord Murray has obtained a concession for the construction of a base on Darien gulf, on the Caribbean coast of Colombia, a direct conflict with the resolution introduced by Senator Lodge last year, inspired by the proposed purchase of a large tract on Magdalena bay by a Japanese corporation, and which amounted to an amplification of the Monroe doctrine, will at once be apparent, and will require some action.

The question would not be so significant were it not for the fact that the concession also includes the construction of railways, docks, quays and "canals," the last named being of the greatest significance. That feature of the concession might be considered England's answer to the Panama canal tolls question, the American attitude concerning which has caused keen dissatisfaction in Great Britain. The influence of Pearson & Son with the British government is also of prime importance. The head of the firm is Lord Cowdray.

It was said as early as August 15 that it was believed here that influence of Cowdray with the British foreign office had much to do with Great Britain's prompt recognition of the Huerta government in Mexico, Pearson & Son having secured great oil concessions contingent on such recognition.

## THOUSANDS REVIEW REMAINS

Bier of Mayor Gaynor Rests in State in New York.

New York—In a double line that never seemed to decrease in length, as the day wore on, thousands of persons Sunday filed through the flower-filled rotunda of the city hall and past the body of William J. Gaynor, lying in state.

About a fifth of the crowd were women and children. Mayor Kline issued an order to keep the rotunda open all night, if necessary, so that all who came might pay their personal tribute to the memory of his predecessor.

All Saturday night the police on guard around the City Hall park had difficulty in keeping the crowds moving, as many tried even to get in line to view the body. Three policemen and three firemen in reliefs of a half hour stood rigidly at attention during the night beside the coffin, which was draped in the Stars and Stripes and the mayor's flag, while beneath could be seen the colors of the Union Jack, placed there at the request of the Gaynor family in recognition of the courtesy extended by the city of Liverpool.

The bier rested on the same spot where the bodies of many famous men have lain in state.

## Steak May Be \$1 a Pound.

Chicago—Unless there is an increase in the meat production in the United States in the next ten years, porterhouse steak will be selling at more than a dollar a pound, according to Gustav Bischoff, of St. Louis, president of the American Meat Packers' association, which began its annual meeting here Monday afternoon.

"If the production of cattle decreases in the same ratio and the population increases as it has, we will see the American workman eating rice and spuds, but no meat," he said.

## Would-Be Cadets Fail.

Washington, D. C.—Many vacancies exist at the West Point Military academy, as the result of failure of both principals and alternates in many cases to pass the cadet examinations and the failure of representatives to hand in nominations in answer to the request of the War department. There is no disposition to lower the standards of admission and it is believed aid of congress will be sought to have the President fill all vacancies for which nominations are not forthcoming in time for the examinations.

## Princess Deaf and Dumb.

Manchester, England—Relatives of the queen of Spain were being shocked by the news that the second daughter of the queen, like her second son, will be both deaf and dumb, says the Manchester Guardian. It is feared that the little Spanish princess is totally deaf, and unless this can be corrected she will probably never be able to speak.
