TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

The regular "Teachers' Annual Institute" for the year 1913 will be held at the high school building, The Dalles, Ore., beginning at 9 o'clock Monday, October 6, and continuing until Wednesday noon.

To accommodate the teachers of Sherman county, who will wish to return to Moro for their own fair on the train leaving The Dalles at 12:45 Wednesday, it was necessary to begin the Institute Monday morning instead of in the afternoon, as most of our teachers would have preferred. A second reason for beginning in the forenoon is that our Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mr. J. A. Churchill, can be with us only on Monday, there being another institute in session which he must attend and cannot reach by leaving The Dalles later than Monday evening. He has promised us additional help in our local institutes, which we shall hold later in the school year.

Teachers must be present at the opening of the Institute and be in attendance during the entire session to secure credit for institute attendance; or in other words, to be entitled to draw their salary from their school district for the three days of the Institute. In the back of the Institute program is a certificate of attendance which must be filled out by the teacher and handed to Prof. W. B. Young, secretary of the Institute, who will mail to them a certificate of attendance, which must in turn be filed with the clerk of the school district. This being done, the teacher is entitled to collect her wages during the time of her attendance at institute. Being in the high school building is not being in attendance at the Institute.

Tuesday evening, Oct. 7, at the Congregational Church, Rev. James Elvin will deliver a lecture on the "Education of Our Girls," a lecture which every parent should hear. Immediately preceding this lecture there will be a thirty minute program furnished by the school children of Wasco county. It is expected that Antelope, Shaniko, Maupin, Tygh Valley, Dufur and Mosier children will be present and furnish a part of this program. A part of the program will be furnished by the boys and girls of The Dalles schools.

The following instructors have been obtained and a really profitable Institute is looked forward to: Supt. J. A. Churchill, J. H. Ackerman, Prof. F. G. Young, of the University of Oregon, F. S. Griffin, of the Agricultural College, E. F. Carleton, Ass't. State Supt., Mrs. M. L. Fulkerson, Primary Instructor, Salem, G. W. Henderson, City Superintendent of Schools, The Dalles, Chas. H. Jones, L. F. Harrington, and Corinne A. Metz, County Librarian.

THE WASCO COUNTY FAIR

The one big event which all of Wasco county and much of Eastern Oregon looks forward to at this time of the year—the Wasco County Fair, will be held next week, Oct. 8, 9, 10 and 11.

The Fair managers are doing everything in their power to make this the best fair in every way that Wasco County has ever held. The best farm products, fruit, fresh and preserved, live stock, manufactured articles, fancy work of all kinds, inventions, school exhibits from the county schools, will be on exhibition, and prizes offered for the best of each.

In the line of amusements, no pains have been spared to procure the best to be had. Some of the worst backing broncos in the West have been rounded up and some of the best "broncho busters" in the West, including

the famous John Spain, and 20 other noted riders, male and female, will give daily exhibitions of their horsemanship. In fact, this feature of the fair will be a somewhat modified replica of the Pendleton Roundup, and those who were so unfortunate as to miss that should not fail to attend the sports next week.

But aside from the amusements, the Wasco County Fair will prove most interesting and instructive to the farmer, the fruitgrower, the stockraiser, in fact to everyone, especially the newer residents in the county, many of whom have not the least idea what a wonderfully rich and diversified section they live in. Wasco is one of the banner counties of the state and the people within its borders should take a deep interest in assisting to make the County Fair a success by attending it and exhibiting their best products. Turn out with your families and get acquainted with your neighbors and learn what the rest of your county is doing. A holiday and a little recreation will do you good.

The immense piles of wood which are heaped up in the front yard of the town speak well for some somebody's energy and enterprise and show to the people passing thru on the trains that Mosier is quite a wood shipping center. But it "looks like thunder" just the same—kind of a pig-in-the-parlor proposition—a condition, by the way, which no doubt will be remedied before another wood-hauling season begins. It will be remembered by many that, in the dim past, before the commercial club gave up the ghost, and while it was still striving to place and keep Mosier "on the map," a concession was secured by the then president of the club, to grade the right of way between the railroad tracks and the town, for a lawn, similar to the one at Hood River. The company at that time also offered to furnish water from their tank, with which to irrigate the lawn. As everybody's business was nobody's business, and there being no one here with authority to act, nothing was done then or since—and we still have the pig in the parlor. Perhaps some of our citizens are satisfied with these and other unpleasant existing conditions; it would appear so, from the vote cast at the recent election, opposing incorporation. But, thank the Lord, these are in the minority and can't hope to much longer retard the progress of the town.

Will any of our orchardists exhibit samples of their apples at the County Fair next week? We certainly hope so. Apple picking has just begun and now is a good time to reserve a box here and there of our choicest fruit for exhibition and prize winning purposes. Other sections of the county, less favored in many ways than we, will be represented by their best products, and shame to Mosier if she does not send something. Are we ashamed of our district, or do we lack the interest in our own welfare and the energy to get up a display? Guess so.

Two of our progressive citizens, E. A. Race and S. E. Francisco, have anticipated some of the improvements which will be made later by the City Fathers, and have had part of the street in front of their places of business top-dressed with the "tailings" from the rock crushers. Enough of this dressing will be of great benefit, especially at this particular corner, where the dust is several inches thick in summer and the mud ditto in winter.

It is reported that an effort is to be made to have the recent Mosier election declared illegal because we "didn't register."

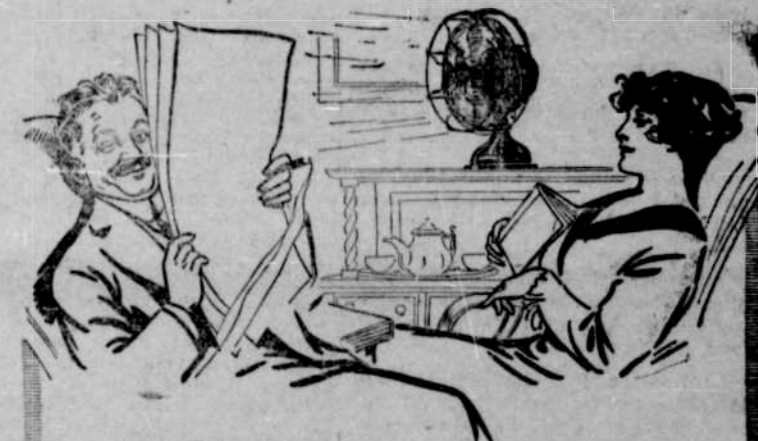
