Attention, Voters!

A mass meeting of the citizens of Mosier will be held in Chown's Hall Monday night next, October 13th, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating a ticket for the election of city officers, said election to be held on the 22nd day of October.

As the matter of choosing the first set of officers is an important one, it is to be desired that the voters will turn out en masse and give the subject the consideration it deserves.

Nearly everyone in town knows what material there is to draw from for the various offices. In fact, several names have been coupled with the mayoralty, as is always the case when an election is due; but up to the present time there seems to be no choice, tho everyone agrees that the mayor should be a man who is thoroughly progressive and at the same time one who will safeguard the city's interests; a man who has the time to devote to the city's business and the ability to get results in dealing with the various matters which are constantly coming up and which require sound judgment to solve.

The councilmen are no less important than the mayor. In fact, upon them lies the responsibility of the city's government, and they should be men of good business ability and sound judgment, keenly alive to and jealous of the city's interests. Questions affecting the future welfare of the city will come before them and they should be ready to give them the earnest consideration they require. We have men in Mosier who can fill the bill, a few of whom have had more or less experience in things municipal.

This is such an innovation for Mosier—this municipality business, that the timid ones appear to think that it means ruin for the community and the individual. These timid ones will admit, later—that is, some of them will, that they were wrong in their predictions about incorporation ruining the town.

However, ye voters, come out next Monday night and choose the citizens whom you are willing to have as city officials.

BUENA VISTA FARM

From a tract of heavily wooded timber to a well improved farm in about a year's time, is the record made by E. B. Vensel, manager of the "Buena Vista Orchards," about six miles south-east of town. This tract, consisting of a fraction over 100 acres, was originally known as the Brooks timber claim.

About a year ago Mr. Vensel put a large force of men on his land to clearing and in this brief time all the land has been cleared and thirty acres set to commercial trees. There is a bearing orchard of six acres on the place, set out by the original owner, and the fruit on these trees proves conclusively that at this altitude, about 2000 feet, apples attain a good commercial size, are beautifully colored and possess the keeping qualities to a marked degree.

The land on the Vensel tract has a north and west slope, so much desired, with the best of air and water drainage, while the soil is a deep volcanic ash—ideal conditions for an apple orchard.

Not only has the land on this large tract undergone a remarkable change in a short year, but other substantial improvements have been made. A modern bungalow, commodious and fur-

nished in elegant taste, has been erected for the manager, Mr. E. B. Vensel, and family, with an electric plant furnishing light and power, and pumping water to the premises, and a modern six-room house for his foreman and right bower, L. H. Leininger, is in course of construction. Besides this there is a large and convenient barn, carriage and tool house, and all the buildings necessary for a well equipped farm. And all this in a space of time much shorter than is often required to start such a project. In fact, the magnitude of the undertaking and the wonderful amount of work accomplished, can only be appreciated by one familiar with the physical conditions existing before the work of clearing began.

The view from the Vensel bungalow is superb. In the clear atmosphere at this altitude Mt. Hood looks but a short distance away, and St. Helens, in Washington, only a trifle farther. The sunsets, as viewed from the verandah of the Vensel bungalow, are wonderful nature pictures, painted by a Master artist, pictures which cannot be duplicated by hand of man.

Taken altogether—the natural advantages of soil, climatic conditions, etc., combined with the scenic beauty, Buena Vista Orchards bid fair to rival in commercial importance, and certainly as a summer home, any of the other well known places in the Mosier District.
