IT IS TO LAUGH!

Mosier had a "nominating convention" last Monday night for the purpose of deciding who of our citizens should "run" for office. Now, there were decided views expressed, beforehand, in regard to non-realty owners holding office, those opposed to it claiming that a mayor or a council composed largely of men who do not own property in the town, would be in a position to work a hardship on those who do own property by saddling them with a burden of debt which they would be free from. All right. There is the possibility that such things might be done in larger towns where there is a chance to graft, or where irresponsible parties were in office--admitting, for argument, that such people could be elected to office. But it is foolish to think that any business man who has invested his money in the town and who depends on the progress and prosperity of the town for his own prosperity, would deliberately attempt to burden the town with heavy taxes.

Well, to get down to brass tacks and label the joke, in case you may overlook it. The "political prayer meeting" was called to order by S. F. Goss, who then called for nominations for temporary chairman and secretary. Dr. Robinson was chosen as chairman and E. A. Race as secretary.

The chairman then stated the object of the meeting and called for nominations for mayor. Before any could be made, J. E. Higley arose and moved that none but property owners should be elected to fill the city offices. The motion was immediately seconded. The motion caused considerable argument before it was put to a vote. As nearly all the voters were present at the meeting it is unnecessary to rehearse the "arguments." Anyhow the motion carried by one vote. Then followed a "silent" nomination for mayor, it having been agreed that the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes should be placed on the ticket. The vote resulted in the nomination as candidates for mayor of Dr. Robinson, E. L. Root and C. G. Nichol. Geo. Wood and J. E. Higley each got one vote. Nominations for councilmen came next and pretty near everyone who owned a foot of ground was nominated, and some who didn't. When they got through nominating there were fourteen candidates in the field, two being women. E. A. Race and P. L. Arthur were nominated for recorder, the former withdrawing in favor of the latter. Guy Q. Stryker was nominated for marshal and J. N. Mosier for treasurer.

Of course the whole proceedings were irregular and did not in any way alter the fact that any legal resident, voter or taxpayer could announce himself as a candidate, if he chose. The straw vote was simply to get an expression of opinion of those present. The idea of taking the vote and forcing the issue was prearranged, in order to prevent certain possible candidates from getting on the ticket. Naturally this was not relished by those who voted against the measure, so the next day they framed up a ticket to suit themselves, with the following persons as candidates: For mayor, Dr. Robinson; for councilmen, S. F. Goss, J. K. McGregor, H. M. West, J. E. Cole, E. A. Race and W. A. Husbands; recorder, P. L. Arthur; marshal, Guy Q. Stryker. They secured more than the necessary 25 signatures to the petitions, with the necessary affidavits attached--remember that. (The joke is coming!) The property owners, hearing of this movement, got busy and circulated petitions for "all property owners" candidates, endorsing Dr. Robinson for mayor, and the

following citizens for councilmen: W. A. Husbands, E. L. Root, O. E. Wilson, G. R. Wood, J. E. Higley and W. E. Chown. Now, neither Dr. Robinson nor Mr. Chown is a realty tax payer. Let us hope, for the sake of their rigid principles, that these good people were ignorant of this fact. However, it looks to some as if they had conveniently forgotten their principles in their efforts to defeat the "liquor element," as it is reported they are pleased to call "the other side."

Well, they got all their petitions off to The Dalles in good time--the law requires that they be in the county clerk's hands by 12 o'clock, noon, on Wednesday; but they failed to attach the necessary affidavits to the petitions! This was not done until sometime after 12 o'clock, which, according to the law, made the petitions illegal and they could be thrown out if it was demanded. This, however, will not be done, as it is the desire of the progressives to have a harmonious town, free from all friction and unpleasantness.

Now, to laugh again, and referring to the saloon bugaboo which seems to be haunting the dreams of some of our citizens who appear inclined to make mountains out of molehills, it is incredible that they are not better informed on this question. They should know that in a dry territory, as Mosier is, it would be impossible to have a saloon without first voting the territory wet. Should that be done, it would still be necessary for a petitioner for a saloon to secure the signatures of a majority of the legal voters of the town in order to get a saloon here. So it will not be necessary to worry about crossing that bridge for awhile. Neither do we think it necessary to worry lest the "progressive" ticket, should it be elected, should incorporate anything in the city charter which would be inimical to the city's best interests. It is only fair to assume that each one of the 12 candidates for the council is honest and will do his duty as he sees it.

A. M. Roop, E. L. Root and Fred Templeire are three Mosierites who have been drawn to serve as jurors at the November term of the circuit court.
