## MOSIER'S FIRST ELECTION

### DR. ROBINSON CHOSEN MAYOR

COUNCIL CONCEDED SATISFACTORY

Mosier's first election of municipal officers was pulled off on Wednesday, as per schedule, with but little excitement, although much interest was manifested by the citizens in the prospects of their favorite candidates for winning out.

The vote was light up until about 2 P. M., and from then on to the close the election board earned their money. The entire registration (78) was voted with the exception of two votes. A number of voters who had neglected to register in time, demanded the privilege of voting anyhow; but, in accordance with their instructions, the board had to refuse them a vote.

The interest of the election centered, of course, in the counting of the ballots, and a number of the candidates and other citizens crowded into the small building to hear the result of the count, which was as follows:

This state of affairs can and should exist; it is a condition which every citizen in Mosier who a pessimist, misanthrope, drone or grouch, surely wishes to attain and which can be attained if our citizens are willing to forget their petty grievances, real or fancied, toward each other, if they have any, put their shoulders to the community wheel and work for the common good and a better MOSIER.

### OF GENERAL INTEREST

Alva L. Day, the Hood River electrical expert who, with "Bunt" Horenberger and Chas. Humerick, the latter accompanied by his wife, is wiring several buildings in town this week, has handed us the following information which will prove interesting to electric light users and others:

October 21, 1913, was the 34th anniversary of the invention of the Edison incandescent lamp. The popular esteem in which Mr. Edison is held throughout the country makes of this fact a news item of general interest.

How often have you heard the remark: "It seems only yesterday that I read about Edison's discovery of electric lighting." Nor was it very long ago—the announcement of Edison's first lamp appeared in the New York Herald of Dec. 21, 1879, two months to a day after its invention. It read:

"Edison's discovery of a substance upon which electricity could produce the light of incandescence with comparative inexpensiveness and perfect effect is one of those little romances of science with which the pathway to every great invention is strewn. We are rejoiced to congratulate not merely Edison, but the people of all civilized nations, upon Edison's success."

Since October 21, 1879, the incandescent lamp has been steadily improved until today the Edison Mazda lamp, the latest and most improved type of incandescent lamp, gives ten times as much light for the same money as the first lamps. They also give three times as much light for the same money as the improved carbon lamps.

Mr. Edison recently said:—"Electric light is the only thing I know of that has grown cheaper in the last twenty years."

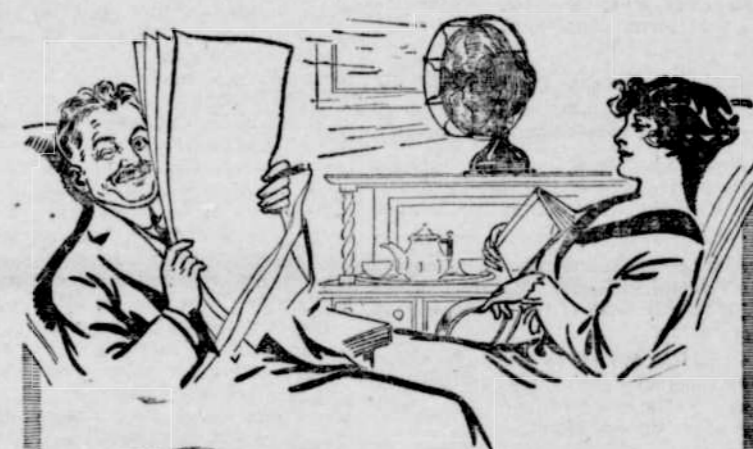
