## MOSIER FRUIT WELL ADVERTISED

### STEINHARDT & KELLY BUY ED L. HOWE'S APPLES

What will probably prove to be the best advertising, from a commercial viewpoint, that the Mosier fruit district has ever received, appeared in last Saturday's edition of the New York Produce News, a paper having a world-wide circulation among fruit buyers and consumers.

The News contained a half-page "ad" of Steinhardt & Kelly, of New York, probably the largest purchasers of fruit in the country, stating that "It affords us great pleasure to be able to announce to the trade that we have acquired on a purchase basis from Mr. Ed. L. Howe, the entire output of the celebrated Lehowa Orchards of Mosier, Oregon."

"Mosier, as is well known, ranks among the three very best producing sections of the Northwest.

"The acquisition by us of this crop of apples, consisting of about 20,000 boxes of different varieties in connection with our other purchases in Hood River, Wenatchee and Yakima, will complete our line-up for the season of 1913-14. Several cars of the Lehowa Orchard Spitzenbergs, Newtowns and Jonathans are now rolling in and will be offered to the better class of trade upon arrival. As the fruit packs over 85% Extra Fancy, despite the most stringent grading rules laid down by Mr. Howe, the owner of this orchard, it is therefore self evident that the Mosier fruit may well be classed among the top-notchers of the world."

This kind of free and unsolicited advertising, read by many thousands of people all over the world, is bound to create an active demand for Mosier fruit and bring MOSIER well into prominence, where she belongs.

### REFERENDUM ELECTION

Next Tuesday is the Referendum election ordered by petition of the voters of Oregon. The following measures will be voted on:

State University Building Repair Fund. Its purpose is to provide funds for repairs and additions to the State University buildings. The amount asked for is \$65,000.

University of Oregon New Building Appropriation. The amount asked for is \$100,000, to construct, equip and furnish a modern fire-proof administration and class-room building, and to extend the heating plant to the same.

There is no question as to the necessity of the funds asked for in order to make the necessary improvements to the institutions of learning, if the efforts to make them more efficient are to be realized, and every voter should mark his ballot 300, Yes, on the first measure and 302, Yes, on the second.

The third measure is the Sterilization Act. Its purpose is to authorize the State Board of Health to order such surgical operations as the board shall adjudge, to be performed on habitual criminals, moral degenerates and sexual perverts, both male and female, and defining who shall be considered as such, the same being persons confined in some state institution.

This measure is designed to protect present society and future generations, and while there is undoubtedly urgent need of protection, it is a question in the minds of many as to the wisdom of giving such authority in the hands of one or two individuals.

The fourth measure is the

County Attorney Act. This provides for a district attorney in each county in the state, and fixes their salaries, in lieu of the present system of having a district attorney for several counties, clothed with the authority to appoint deputies for other counties.

The last measure is called the Workmen's Compensation Act, the purpose of which is to create a State Industrial Accident Commission composed of three Commissioners, to provide a fund for the compensation of injured workmen employed in hazardous occupations, to be raised partly by the state, partly by employers and partly by employees, the commission to determine the amount under the act to be paid any person or persons on account of any injury received in the course of his employment.

The election board for Mosier Precinct is as follows: Judges, Geo. R. Wood, C. T. Bennett, C. J. Littlepage. Clerks, H. G. Kibbee, George Chamberlain, Lee Hunter.

While Mosier has been divided into two voting precincts, East and West Mosier, there will be but one polling place, which will be the commercial club building.

### APPLE PACKING RECORD BROKEN

The Hood River Glacier says that W. L. Dresbach last week broke the world's record for apple packing in one day. The former record was 140 boxes in ten hours. Dresbach packed 141 boxes in nine and one-half hours. He was packing at Gilkey Station, near Seio, for Messrs. Minton & Gibson.

Mr. Dresbach is a Mosierite, owning a tract of land near town.

### WILL THE DALLES BE DRY OR WET?

Besides the Referendum election next Tuesday, The Dalles will vote on the saloon question. In fact, this is the paramount issue of the day at the county seat, the entire town taking sides on the question, each side being confident of success. The Dalles Optimist says:

"If The Dalles goes 'dry' next Tuesday, the next levy of taxes will more than double. This is a statement of fact for the taxpayer to consider. And it will more than double on the owner of the humble home as it will more than double on the possessions of his more prosperous neighbors. Meanwhile the traffic in liquor, and the consumption of liquor, will go on. In violation of the law, it is true, but it will go on regardless of law. Prohibition begets law-breakers. Licensed traffic makes failure to observe the law unnecessary and unlikely under strict regulation."
