# REBELS CAPTURE PORT OF ENTRY

City of Juarez Changes Hands for Sixth Time.

## Federal Garrison Taken By Surprise—Rebels Get Artillery, Guns and Ammunition.

El Paso, Tex.—For the sixth time in the last three years Ciudad Juarez changed governments when 2000 rebels, led by General Pancho Villa, attacked and captured the town between 2:30 and 5 o'clock Sunday morning. Taken completely by surprise, the federal garrison of approximately 400 men put up a weak resistance.

So unprepared for battle were the federal defenders that Villa's troops actually reached the center of town before a single shot was fired.

Although an accurate count has not been completed, it is estimated that 40 persons were killed in the fighting. The rebels lost five men, the federal dead is estimated at 30, and four or five non-combatants were killed.

Among them was Charles Segerson, of El Paso, an automobile driver, who was on the main street of Juarez in his automobile.

"No looting" was the order given by Villa to his men after the town had surrendered, and not a single case of theft has been reported. Guards were placed in every town square with orders to shoot the first man who attempted to loot.

The rebels took 125 federal prisoners, 35,000 rounds of ammunition, two field pieces and two machine guns—all in addition to an important port of entry and a military strategic point.

General Francisco Castro, commander of the Juarez garrison, is among the missing. It is the general opinion that he escaped. No trace of him or his body has been found. His sword, sash and cap were found in his residence on Juarez avenue, and General Villa has them for souvenirs.

El Paso police thought they had captured General Castro in El Paso, but the prisoner proved to be a colonel from the Juarez garrison. He was sent to Fort Bliss a prisoner.

Bullets fell thick in El Paso during the attack, and Lester Burns, a messenger boy, was shot in the hand while walking the streets in the early hours. Almost all the downtown business structures were hit by bullets.

United States troops took station near the international boundary and held the Americans away from the danger zone as much as possible while the battle lasted. Order was quickly restored in Juarez after the capitulation.

## CONNECTICUT LEGISLATORS SCARED AT OWN LAWS

Hartford, Conn.—Some laws passed by the last general assembly and now effective are proving a surprise, even to the legislators who made them. One law provides strict punishment for any person who carries a lighted cigarette or pipe into a streetcar. It has already caught many persons, most of whom had unconsciously failed to extinguish their cigars. The conductor had handed the offender a printed warning, taken his name, and later a police officer has served a summons. Legislators express surprise that they ever voted for such a law.

## The new workmen's compensation law as passed exempted employers of fewer than five persons. This exemption was to overcome granger opposition.

## Air Somersaults Common At Aviation Carnival

Versailles, France—Flying head downward and turning complete somersaults in the air is becoming common in the French aviation field. Hanouille, a French aeroplanist, flew over the aviation field here for 20 seconds while his machine was upside-down and then cut two vertical circles in the air.

Hucks, an Englishman, asserted he would outdo Hanouille and flew 35 seconds with his head downward and accomplished four V loops.

## Cabin Creek is Lawless.

Charleston, W. Va.—Lawlessness still continues in the coal regions of Cabin Creek, despite the efforts of operators and United Mine Workers' officials. Insufficient police protection is charged, and miners who desire to work are interfered with to such an extent they are unable to work with profit to themselves or their employers. Within a radius of 15 miles during eight weeks there have been five murders, two towns have been shot up by armed combatants, two robberies and 12 persons injured.

## Redfield Praises Heroes.

Washington, D. C.—Two heroes of the sea were commended in letters sent by Secretary Redfield of the department of commerce, to Emil C. Teus, assistant keeper of the light at Waukegan, Ill., and to Captain Charles Richardson, of the tender Manzanita, off Seattle, Wash. Teus rescued a hunter whose boat had been overturned in Lake Michigan. Captain Richardson, while cruising near Seattle, risked his life and vessel to save six persons, four of whom were women and children, in a motorboat.

## Militia Instructors Detailed.

Washington, D. C.—Captain McLaughlin, Twenty-first infantry, has been detailed as instructor of the Oregon militia, with headquarters at Portland. Captain Harold D. Coburn, Twentieth infantry, is detailed as instructor of the Washington militia, with headquarters at Seattle.

## Crop Money Deposited.

Washington, D. C.—The secretary of the treasury has deposited \$800,000 with depository banks in Oregon to aid in moving the crops and has made a deposit of \$300,000 in depositories of Washington for the same purpose.

# Rebels Request Hale to Present His Credentials

Nogales, Sonora, Mex.—Francisco Escudero, minister of foreign relations in the Carranza cabinet, has asked William Bayard Hale, President Wilson's agent, to present his credentials before continuing further with the conferences which have been under way here informally for several days.

This was interpreted by many as a virtual demand for recognition of the Constitutional revolution by the diplomatic exchanges between the Carranzistas and the Washington government.

Escudero explained that the request was made in order to make the conferences formal, so that they might be concluded promptly. He said that heretofore Hale had received unofficially and that the cabinet members had acted merely as individuals in the "exchange of impressions."

"For our part the extra-official negotiations are ended," declared Escudero. "We have asked Mr. Hale to present his formal credentials. I would receive them as minister of foreign relations and transmit them to my chief."

"We have been glad to meet Mr. Hale on terms of friendliness. We know of his previous investigations in Mexico. The cabinet members on previous occasions met as individuals only. Each was a member of the cabinet, true, but the cabinet did not meet."

"The exchange of impressions now has ended."

## FRESH EGGS ARE 70c IN SAN FRANCISCO MARKETS

San Francisco—Fresh eggs reached 70 cents a dozen here Wednesday, the highest quotation since the mining days, with the prediction current among dealers that they would go higher. There is a tradition that in the days of the What Cheer House eggs were sold in San Francisco at \$1 each, but that was when boots were \$25 a pair and bacon was \$2 a pound.

## "Amuse Hens" Is Order of Wisconsin Poultryman

Madison, Wis.—Amusement and exercise for poultry is advocated by James G. Halpin, poultry man for the college of agriculture of the University of Wisconsin, as a means of preventing the annual winter shortage of eggs.

"Right now poultry houses should be deeply bedded, with dry straw," said Mr. Halpin, "and the grain feed should be worked into this litter so the hens may get good exercise and amusement hunting for it. If nothing of this kind is done, the flock will huddle together and lose all interest in life, and winter eggs will be few."

"It is well to get the hens to exercising and singing. They work for their feed."

## Homestead Ruling Made.

Washington, D. C.—In the case of John R. Buchser, homestead entryman in the state of Washington, against the guardians of four minor children, the Supreme court holds that the Federal government's control over a homestead entry ceased with the issuance of patent and that after the patent issued the land became subject to state laws. In this case Buchser's wife claimed a half interest in the homestead, but deeded it after the patent issued. The Supreme court holds the wife's contention is valid.

## Postal Change Is Issue.

Washington, D. C.—Representative Bryan, of Washington, introduced a resolution calling on the Postmaster general to explain his grounds for removing the postmaster at Port Orchard, Wash.

Miss Ethel Johnson was postmistress and recently married. Immediately she lost her job, the department contending that the marriage automatically cancelled her commission. Mr. Bryan disputes this, but he is doubly incensed because the department appointed a standpat Republican.

## Tramp Prevents Wreck.

Jesup, Ga.—Scores of passengers left the coaches of a railway train 16 miles north of here Thursday to shake the hand of a tramp who prevented a wreck. The train, carrying four crowded sleepers and several day coaches, was rushing toward a broken rail at a speed of 60 miles an hour when the tramp appeared in front of the locomotive wildly waving his arms. When the train stopped it was within a few feet of the bad rail.

## Voice Vailed Across Sea.

London—Voiced sounds, but not actual words, have been transmitted by wireless telephone across the Atlantic Ocean from Clifden, Ireland, to Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, according to a statement made here by William Marconi, the inventor of wireless telegraphy. Mr. Marconi says "no conversation" was held in the recent experiments made by him.

## Ezra Meeker Under Knife.

Seattle, Wash.—Ezra Meeker, veteran of the Oregon trail, who at 78 years of age traveled by ox team from the Pacific to the Atlantic, marking the historic highway, was stricken with serious illness at Chehalis Wednesday. After undergoing an operation at Providence Hospital, Seattle, he made a rally which leads attending physicians to predict his recovery.

## Police Job Given Chinese.

Los Angeles—Los Angeles acquired the first Chinese policeman in the United States Wednesday, according to Chief of Police Sebastian, who made Lung Yip, member of a Chinese business firm, a special officer. Policeman Lung was born in San Francisco and educated in the public schools of that city.
