BRYANS' COUSIN DEAD HERE

Wm. T. Bryan, who claimed to be a cousin of Wm. Jennings Bryan, died a miserable death on the outskirts of Mosier, on Tuesday of this week, from paralysis. He was 75 years old.

About a month ago he and his crippled wife passed thru Mosier and, with the permission of S. D. Fisher, moved into his old ranch house, east of town. There they had since lived in destitution and misery. But few people knew of their condition or existence until the news was brought to town that the poor old man was dead.

The aged couple have children somewhere in Nebraska, but for some time past had not kept in touch with them. The widow has two brothers in Illinois, but neither one is in a position to render much financial assistance, so she has offered her home in his family, and some money to help buy a ticket. The Odd Fellows will probably make up the difference.

Rev. H. C. Clark officiated at the funeral services, which were held at the Christian Church, interment being in Odd Fellows cemetery.
