MORGAN QUILTS BIG COMPANIES

Move Makes Important Epoch in Financial World.

Four Other Prominent Financiers Follow—End of Interlocking Directorates Is Seen.

New York—The withdrawal of J. P. Morgan & Co., from more than a score of great corporations and the statement by George F. Baker, an almost equally dominant figure in American finance, that he soon would take similar action gave Wall street a thrill that almost brought trading on the Stock Exchange to a halt.

While it is probably true that many of the prominent bankers had information foreshadowing this momentous move toward ending interlocking directorates, the public and brokers had no advance knowledge of what was taking place in the inner councils of the greatest of all American houses of finance. Wherever telephone and ticker flashed the news about the street, groups of men gathered to discuss what was the all-absorbing topic.

Mr. Morgan, departing from his firm's traditional policy of silence, made a public statement announcing the withdrawal of five members of J. P. Morgan & Co. from directorships in 27 corporations and the intention to withdraw from more. The statement said:
"The necessity of attending many board meetings has been so serious a burden on our time that we have long wished to withdraw from the directorates of many corporations. Many of these directorships we have accepted with reluctance, and only because we felt constrained to keep in touch with properties which we had reorganized or whose securities we had recommended to the public, both here and abroad."
"An apparent change in public sentiment in regard to directorships seems now to warrant us in seeking to resign from some of these connections."
"Indeed, it may be in view of the change in sentiment on the subject, that we shall be in better position to serve such properties and their security holders, if we are not directors. We have already resigned from the companies mentioned and we expect from time to time to withdraw from other boards on which we feel there is no special obligation to remain."

MARTIAL LAW DECLARED AND SALOONS CLOSED

Copperfield, Or.—Martial law has been declared at Copperfield by Colonel B. K. Lawson. He was supported by five members of the Coast artillery. Miss Fern Hobbs, private secretary to Governor West, demanded that the saloonmen in the council resign, and they refused. She then left town and martial law was declared, all the saloons were seized, and the city officials placed under arrest.
The saloonmen were given 24 hours to ship their bar fixtures and liquors out of the county, on penalty of their confiscation.
The city officials under arrest are not even permitted to communicate with their attorneys.

Lazy Husbands Earn Much Cash for Families

Seattle Wash.—Husbands and fathers to the number of 30 earned \$901.50 for their families as the King county lockstep, under Sheriff Edward Cuddehe, filed in the county commissioners' office.
The husbands and fathers are sent to the stocks on the commitment of Justice Fred C. Brown, who was the father of the law, and specific sentences are given at a rate per day according to the size of the man's family. The rate varies from \$1 to \$1.50.

Employee Share \$30,000

Washington, D. C.—Nearly 1000 employees of the Washington Street Railway company began the new year with a portion of the company's surplus for the last 12 months. Under a profit-sharing plan, more than \$30,000 was distributed among employees. Each check was accompanied by a letter from President King thanking the employee for his faithful service. Motormen and conductors who had been in the service only one month got \$3.55 each; those in the service more than a year got \$42.53.

Buried Treasure Found

Michigan City, Ind.—Twenty dollar gold pieces amounting to \$1400 were found by Mrs. William McCorkle, of McCook, Ind., when they had been buried under a tree across from her home eight years ago by her father, Nathaniel Marshall, a carpenter. The family dispersed after their home was burned eight years ago and Marshall went to live with his son in Iowa. Just before Marshall died he told his son of burying the gold. The young man did not credit the story, but told his sister that her Christmas reunion.

Woman in Air Loop Loop

Hendon, England.—Gustave Hemel, for the first time in the history of aviation, looped the loop in an aeroplane with a woman passenger, Miss Mary Trehanke Davis. She had accompanied Hemel on many previous flights, notable among them one from London to Paris. In the Paris flight Miss Davis gained the distinction of being the first woman to cross the English channel in a heavier-than-air machine.

Radium Land Withdrawal Indorsed

Washington, D. C.—The proposal of Secretary Lane to withdraw all lands of the public domain believed to contain radium, in the interest of the public good, meets with the hearty approval of Dr. George Otis Smith, director of the Federal geological survey.

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Free Competition Urged.
Madison, Wis.—"My proposal is neither regulated competition nor regulated monopoly, but freedom in competition, prohibition of monopoly, permission for co-operation and regulation of the latter."
This was the solution of the trust question as announced by President Van Hise, of the University of Wisconsin, at a meeting of the Saturday Lunch club here last Saturday. He defended the Supreme court in writing the word "reasonable" into the Sherman anti-trust law.

Sea Equally Essential.
Washington, D. C.—"This nation does not desire vice admirals in order to take precedence over officers of other navies," Secretary Daniels said Monday, "but rather to place our officers on an equality with foreign officers. Several instances have occurred which showed the urgent necessity for this rank in our dealings with other navies." Mr. Daniels, further discussing his proposal, pointed out that at present vessels of three of the United States fleets were in positions requiring vice-admirals in command.

Farmer Sells Wine. Is Fined.
Walla Walla, Wash.—Supplementing his farm income by selling wine without a license proved disastrous to Peter Pieri, a farmer living near this city. He paid \$90 into Justice's court for selling red wine made at his home.

SHIPS HELD AT RIVER'S MOUTH

Gale Lashes Sea and Channel Into Mass of Foam.

Many Points in Oregon and Washington Report Wind and Rain Storm Worst Ever.

Astoria—Wind attains a velocity of 80 miles an hour; many vessels bar-bowed.

Fort Stevens—Hammond water front damaged by high seas.

Raymond—Ninety-mile gale at Willapa Harbor; three-story frame building razed.

Portland—Day's rainfall 1.12 inches; trains to north delayed.

Vancouver—Rainfall Sunday, 1.73 inches; slides delay traffic on Northern Pacific.

Astoria, Or.—"The worst in years" is the way everyone described the southeast gale that revived Saturday and raged with unabated fury for two days. The wind at times attained a velocity of 80 miles an hour. Breakers were so high that the bar at the mouth of the river was a mass of white foam. The weather was so thick with rain and mist that navigation was extremely hazardous.

Fifteen barbound ships dared not attempt to cross out. Incoming vessels reported that even should the steamers go out they could make little headway in the face of the terrific gale. The steamer Breakwater arrived off the bar at 7 a. m., but as the booms had been thick, it was not until four hours later that Captain Macginn could pick up the channel and cross in.

Raymond Building Topples.
Raymond, Wash.—This city and the entire Willapa Harbor district was visited Saturday and Sunday by the worst wind storm in its history. The gale started early Saturday afternoon and by midnight was blowing at a velocity estimated to be 90 miles an hour. This continued through Saturday night and the greater part of Sunday.

The new steamer Solano returned to the upper harbor with a bad list, occasioned by a topheavy load of lath and shingles, which absorbed the moisture, weighing the vessel down. This deck cargo shifted in the terrific wind.

Although Raymond is well protected from winds, the gale razed a three-story frame building under construction for a lodging house, practically wrecking the structure, which was nearly completed.

Hammond Protection Gone.
Fort Stevens, Or.—The recent heavy tides, accompanied by violent storms, are causing considerable damage to lower river interests. It is assumed that the deflection of the current to the Oregon shore by the jetty construction is the primary cause.

Piling put in by the city of Hammond to protect the waterfront has been washed out completely and nearly one-half of the leading business street of the city has been partly undetermined by the action of the water.

Kansas Is Fighting "Spinster" Tax Law

Topeka, Kan.—The state of Kansas puts a tax on widows, spinsters and bachelors, and the widows and spinsters want it removed. Several efforts heretofore made to remove this tax have been blocked because they would also remove the tax on bachelors, and this the state does not want to do. Under the constitution the man at the head of a family receives a tax rebate on \$200 every year. The bachelor, the spinster and the widow do not receive this rebate.

A woman and her husband, with two children and \$200 worth of personal property and other securities, may go along for years exempt from taxation. When the husband dies the widow must immediately begin paying taxes.

An old maid school teacher, by working hard and skipping, managed to support her three brothers and sisters on \$60 a month, but she has to pay taxes on every penny's worth of furniture she possesses. Across the street lives a widower with three children and almost a duplication of the spinster's personal property, but under the Kansas law he is exempt from taxation because he is the "head of the family."
