Not having sufficient stamps nor sacks enough in the Paradise office, requisition had to be made for them. The seed is being sent via Asotin. The roads are in such bad condition the shipper found it cheaper to ship by parcel post than to make the trip himself. The rate will be \$1.04 per hundredweight, therefore costing him \$34.32.

Anarchy Grips Albania.
Vienna—Private letters from Avlona depict Albania as the prey of famine and anarchy. Owing to lack of money, business is at a standstill. Exports have ceased and imports are so small that the people face starvation. Flour and meat are at exorbitant prices and other articles of food can scarcely be obtained. The towns and villages are overrun with beggars, whose importunities are so threatening. Despite efforts of the provisional authorities, crime is rampant.

Naval Balloons Advised.
Washington, D. C.—Equipment of all battlehips with at least one aeroplane, the use by the navy of dirigible balloons and the concentration of all naval aeronautical training work at Pensacola, Fla., are among the principal recommendations of the board of officers appointed by Secretary Daniels to draw up a comprehensive plan for the organization of a naval aeronautical service. The board's report was made public Monday with the announcement that it had been approved by the secretary.

Shanghai Editor Killed.
Shanghai—Z. F. How, manager and director of the Commercial Press, was shot dead in the street Sunday. The assassin was arrested. How began his career as a small printer and built up the Commercial Press, which possesses the finest printing works in Asia.

OJINAGA TAKEN BY REBEL ARMY

Federal Garrison, With 9 Generals, Crosses Border.

Short of Ammunition, No Resistance Is Made to Final Blow—Refugees in Bad Plight.

Presidio, Tex.—The Mexican federal army with its nine generals, evacuated Ojinaga, Mex., at 10 o'clock Saturday night. The triumphant rebel forces under General Francisco Villa immediately occupied the village.

The defeat of the federal army followed only a few hours fighting in which the rebels, beginning at sundown, started to close in on the besieged garrison with a terrific fire of cannon, shrapnel and rifles.

General Castro and General Mercado, of the federal regulars, saw that the assault was to be nothing less than a massacre. The federals had left only 50 rounds of ammunition for each man. General Castro and Mercado therefore gave the order to evacuate. All the federal soldiers and their officers who could scramble to the American side did so. The others ran in all directions.

General Pascual Orozco, commander of federal volunteers, threatened with summary execution by Villa, was the first to cross. It was believed he escaped into the mountains of Texas.

Twenty-eight hundred Mexican federal soldiers, six generals, 200,000 rounds of ammunition, two cannon, four large field pieces and 1500 civilian refugees were in the custody of the United States army border post as the result of the rout of the federal army and its flight into American territory and the occupation of the village by General Francisco Villa's rebels.

The distress of the refugees is appalling. Men, women, children, dogs, and chickens and cattle are packed together in a space covering several acres. About them are scattered all the wreck and turmoil they brought in fleeing from the Ojinaga battle.

Urgent requests for immediate removal of the soldiers and refugees to some other place were sent by Major McNamee to the War department through Brigadier General Bliss. Generals Mercado, Castro, Orphinal, Romero, Aduno and Landu are in custody of the United States troops awaiting their disposition by the War department.

General Pascual Orozco and General Ynez Salazar, federal volunteer commanders, escaped along the border to a point remote from Presidio. Salazar was wounded. They were accompanied by General Caraveo, General Rojas and 300 cavalrymen. Salazar and Orozco are being watched for in the United States on indictments charging them with violating the neutrality laws.

General Landu said he was certain all the federal generals escaped.

Dry Sheet of Paper Extinguishes Fire
Portland—A newspaper served as fire extinguisher Sunday when sunlight concentrated by a magnifying glass hanging in the window of a jewelry store at 191 Morrison street became focused on a background of soft woodwork.

Noticing a group surrounding the store window about noon when on his way to a restaurant, a fireman investigated and found the woodwork smoldering. The fireman notified Captain Dalton at fire headquarters and when that dignitary arrived and saw the source of the smoke he refused to allow the show window to be broken. Calling for a newspaper, which was furnished by one of the onlookers, Captain Dalton placed a sheet over the window, thereby shutting out the sunlight. The smoke ceased and no alarm was necessary.

It is understood that the treatment with radium, which was temporarily suspended, has been resumed.

Nebraska Lifts Tango Lid.
Lincoln, Neb.—The ban on all "rag" dances, which has been in effect at the University of Nebraska, has been lifted by Miss Mary Graham, dean of women. The annual military ball, the first formal dance of the year, to be held soon, is the cause of the change in the edict.

The tango, the castelwalk, the one-step and other novelty dances, will be permitted, under the condition "that they are danced right." Heretofore nothing but the waltz, two-step and five-step have been permitted.

Steamer Passes Canal.
Colon—The first steam vessel passed through the Panama canal January 7. It was the Alexander Lavally, a crane boat, and carried no passengers.

ARMY DECLARED SHORT OF GUNS

Chief of Staff Urges Provision for Liberal Supply.

Ammunition Also Lacking—Guns Without It Worse than Junk—Folley to Wait.

Washington, D. C.—Explaining his judgment was not influenced by the Mexican situation, Major General Wood, chief of staff of the army, has advised committees of congress that it should appropriate \$3,000,000 for field guns and ammunition for the regular army and \$3,000,000 for the militia.

"If you sent our troops into war as they are now, without guns or ammunition, it would be absolute slaughter," the general told the house military committee. "If called into the field suddenly we should have to go with a small allowance of ammunition, even for the guns in the hands of the troops, and we should have neither guns nor ammunition enough for our field artillery forces."

General Wood, in a written statement, said:
"We have neither guns nor ammunition sufficient to give any general commanding any assurance of success if attacked by an army of equal size which is supplied with its proper quota of field artillery.
It is my belief that no modern war between first-class powers will last for more than one year, and thus if private manufacturers are not encouraged to manufacture ammunition for our guns until after war is declared, they will not be in a condition to do so until after the war is finished, and the supply of ammunition during the war will be limited to what the arsenal can turn out. If guns are not supplied on the battlefield with the ammunition which they can be reasonably expected to use, they are not efficient, and when guns have exhausted the ammunition supplied they are worse than junk, for they must be protected by other troops."

"The War department believes that in case of war with a first-class power an army of 500,000 men will be needed to give this country any chance of success against invasion, and that this force will be needed at once. To make it efficient it must be given its proper quota of field artillery. To do this, this ammunition must be on hand, for it cannot be supplied after war is started."

AMERICA SENDS CHARITY ALL OVER THE WORLD
Washington, D. C.—Aid was extended Friday to the distressed districts of Japan, Mexico, Bulgaria and the United States by the American Red Cross society.

Five thousand dollars was cabled to the American ambassador at Tokio for relief work among the people of the northern section of Japan, where a famine is reported. A similar sum was sent to Bulgarian war sufferers, \$500 was dispatched to Chioh, Sinaloa, Mexico, where there is a food shortage; \$10,000 was forwarded to the central flood relief committee at Houston, Tex., and \$10,000 was telegraphed to Presidio, Tex., for the relief of the Mexican wounded at Ojinaga.

"Strictly Fresh" Egg Packed Five Years Ago
Bellevue, N. Y.—John J. Sweeney, of New York City, was suspicious of an egg he bought in market a few days ago. It bore the name of Clara Baker carefully pencilled on it, and Mr. Sweeney wrote to Miss Baker to know about how long ago it was that she wrote her name on the egg that Mr. Sweeney had bought for "strictly fresh."
The letter was delivered to Mrs. John Wright, of Bellevue, who, before her marriage four years ago last July, was Miss Clara Baker. She remembered having written her name on an egg she packed for shipment at a grocery in which she was employed about six months before her marriage.

Dutch and Albanians Disarm Turkish Force
Avlona, Albania—A decree prohibiting the sale of arms and ammunition among the Albanians over the arrest of six Turkish officers and 200 Turkish soldiers who arrived here on board an Austrian steamer from Constantinople. Their visit was with the object of announcing the accession to the Albanian throne of Izzet Pasha, formerly Turkish minister of war.
