Mile of Burned Railroad.
More than a mile of burned railroad bridge was rebuilt in 12 days this summer. It was the two-track bridge across Newark bay, N. J., 5,627 feet long, including a draw 254 feet long. The fire was yet in progress when the reconstruction was decided on and the plans got ready. Orders were given for 14 pile drivers, 13 marine derricks, 21 scows, two tugs, six catamarans, five air compressors, three water boats, two derrick cars, two locomotive trains, three switch engines, two teams of horses, 3,000,000 feet of lumber and for the assembling of 1500 men.—Baltimore American.

Alleged Moving Picture Trust Makes Fight
New York.—The right of a company leasing moving picture films to supply films without competition within a specified territory was defended by a member of the so-called motion picture trust in the government's suit against the Motion Picture Patents company, the General Film company and others for alleged violation of the Sherman law. Frank L. Dyer, president of the General Film company, asserted that there was an element of speculation in moving picture making. He said: "It is right that one city or territory should be supplied exclusively by one film exchange in order to prevent the same pictures from running at two theaters at the same time. There are what we call 'moving picture fans' who attend two or three shows a night."

May Remove Embargo On Arms.
Washington, D. C.—Developments in the Mexican situation here emphasized the determination of the Washington government to refuse to recognize any of the acts of the new Mexican congress. It also was shown that President Wilson was considering the question of permitting exportation of arms to all factions. Secretary Bryan had a long conference with Senator Alaga, of the Mexican embassy. It is understood Mr. Bryan said the United States considered the election of congressmen as invalid as the voting for president and vice-president.

Diaz Advises Huerta to Quit.
Paris.—General Porfirio Diaz has advised General Victoriano Huerta to retire from the presidency of Mexico. In outlining his attitude General Diaz said that in the present situation in relation to the United States it was not a question of whether Huerta was the best man for the presidency nor was it a question whether the revolutionists were right or wrong; it was a question of patriotism. He counseled Huerta to renounce any feelings of personal prestige or power and thus save Mexico from a calamity.

Cabinet Backs Wilson

In Mexican Policy
Washington, D. C.—President Wilson's cabinet stands firmly behind him in his efforts to force the retirement of Provisional President Huerta as a necessary step to the pacification of Mexico. For more than two hours the cabinet discussed Thursday every phase of the Mexican situation. The consensus of opinion was that the United States should not take a single backward step in its program to restore constitutional government in Mexico.

It became known that all the secretaries favored steps which would convince Huerta that the United States was in earnest in its demands. Some of the cabinet members recognized in the lifting of the embargo on arms a practical and perhaps early solution of the difficulty, but there was no final decision on the point. There is a hope on the part of the president and Secretary Bryan that a measure so radical as permitting exportations of arms may not be required to solve the problem. Influences are at work which, in the opinion of many officials, may force the early collapse of the Huerta regime. There is a closer understanding and more frequent communication between the state department here and foreign governments generally than has been in evidence at any time since the Mexican problem came so widely international.

Through ambassadors abroad and through the diplomatic corps in Washington, Secretary Bryan is giving such detailed information of the American policy as to leave no doubt of what the United States wishes accomplished. So far as is known there have been no direct requests for foreign support, but the intimations that the United States would like foreign nations to refrain completely from interference in the affairs of the Huerta government are expected to produce tangible results. "Which Mr. Jones," the secretary is an acquiescence in its policy by the powers, such an approval to carry with it discouragement of financial aid to the Huerta regime through foreign channels. A few weeks of financial isolation, it is looked by high officials here, will force the retirement of Huerta.

Hill Lines To Build

Big Docks at Astoria
To accommodate the two mighty steamers that will ply between Astoria and San Francisco after January 1, 1915, the Hill railway interests plan extensive improvements at Astoria that will put that city distinctly on the map, and at the same time make Portland a greater seaport than ever.

According to the plans for the Astoria line, as announced yesterday by James J. Hill in his speech before the Portland Transportation club, these ships will be the finest that modern marine engineers can design. To take care of the 225 feet of length, great improvements are to be constructed. To reach the dock to transfer thereto the loads of passengers and freight, new tracks must be laid. To load the vessels with the down coast cargoes, great derricks and cranes must be erected.

It was stated at the office of President Joseph H. Young of the North Bank this morning that these improvements will not be undertaken for several months.

"Spugs" Make Plans for

Nation-Wide Campaign
New York.—A country-wide appeal for the abolition of useless Christmas gifts and a plea for intelligent and thoughtful giving instead were voiced by Mrs. August Belmont, president of the Spugs, at the opening meeting of the 1913 campaign to be waged by that organization against insincerity, compulsion, and waste in Christmas giving.

At this meeting the membership rolls of the Spugs—the Society for the Prevention of Useless Giving—were thrown open to all residents of the United States who might want to enroll against the foolish Christmas gift.

Mrs. J. Borden Harriman presided at the meeting. Mrs. Belmont was the orator. The original purpose of the society, she said, was to prevent compulsory giving by girls in stores and factories to their employers, the custom of collective giving, which the girls felt they could not afford, but which they could not avoid without embarrassment and positive loss of their positions.

Wedding Cake is Huge.

New York.—Miss Jessie Wilson's wedding cake was baked here Thursday. The first layer of the cake is four inches thick and 22 inches across. When ready for the knife the cake will weigh 135 pounds, and will be two and one-half feet tall, including the vase of white orchids to be placed on top. It will cost about \$500, and will contain 19 ingredients. In 2900 dainty white boxes, tied with satin ribbon, the cake will be distributed, each box the proper size to go under one pillow to dream on.

Orange Crop Promising.

Los Angeles.—California's orange crop this winter will be approximately 40,000 carloads, according to estimates received here from the various districts by G. Harold Powell, general manager of the California fruit growers' exchange. Of this 6000 carloads will be from the northern citrus sections. This means the crop will be a little larger than that of two years ago.

More than \$1,000,000 has been expended in frost protection. Prices are expected to be at least normal.

Messenger Confers With Carranza.

Nogales, Sonora.—Bayard Hale crossed the international line into Mexico at 9 o'clock Wednesday night and immediately went into conference with General Carranza. It was indicated that the meeting was merely preliminary to formal conferences to be begun between the man supposed to be the personal representative of President Wilson and the leader of the constitutionalists.

Guns Offered Militants.

London.—According to the Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent a German dealer in arms and munitions of war, understanding that the English suffragettes are contemplating a "strong" organization, has offered to sell to the militants an unlimited quantity of repeating rifles at 4½ marks (\$1.12) apiece.
