GOETHALS TO BE CANAL GOVERNOR

Builder of Panama Waterway Is Placed at Head.

Salary \$5000 Per Year Less— Authority Second Only to That of Secretary of War.

Washington, D. C.—Organization of a permanent government for the Panama Canal zone to supersede the Isthmian Canal commission on April 1 was authorized by President Wilson with the announcement that the nomination of Colonel George W. Goethals to be first governor of the Panama Canal zone will be sent to the senate in a few days.

Colonel Goethals' idea of a "one man" government is carried out in the executive order, which was made public by Secretary Garrison after the cabinet meeting. The authority of the governor will be supreme under the secretary of war.

Official notification of his selection was cabled to Colonel Goethals at Panama. Secretary Garrison said he was confident there would be no question about his acceptance. The change in title will mean a loss of \$5000 a year to the head of the zone, as the governor's salary will be \$10,000, and he now receives \$15,000 as chairman of the commission.

Secretary Garrison announced that it was proposed to resolve the members of the commission with the exception of Colonel Goethals into a new commission to arrange for and conduct the ceremonies incident to the opening of the canal. Congress will be asked to provide the necessary legislation.

As the legislative order only terminates the existence of the Panama commission on April 1, but also the present organization of the working force of the zone, many of the army officers connected therewith will lose the increased pay which they have been receiving under the commission form of government.

RADIO STATION SIGNALS FROM ARLINGTON TO PARIS

Washington, D. C.—The New Year greeting flashed to the world from the naval radio tower at Arlington, Va., was received by the Eiffel tower in Paris and by a shore station at New Brunswick, Canada. Reports to date show that the message was also picked up as far west as Colorado.

Avalanche Kills Three; Many Narrow Escapes

Storrs, Utah—With a roar that could be heard for miles an avalanche, sweeping down the mountainside, Wednesday instantly snuffed out three lives and seriously injured three other persons. Four houses were ground to splinters. Every tree in the path of the icy mass was snapped off at the roots.

The bodies of Mrs. Anna Packovich and two Greek miners were recovered soon after they met their deaths. All had been trapped in their homes, where they were crushed almost beyond recognition.

An hour after the slide came, E. T. Thorne was rescued six feet below the surface of the snow. The debris had packed in such a way that he escaped suffocation. He suffered internal injuries and a broken leg.

Shortly before his rescue two Greek laborers were uncovered. Both were badly bruised and nearly suffocated.

When the avalanche started Mrs. A. P. Webb was standing on her porch with an infant in her arms and two children by her side. They fled along the mountainside, and although shored by flying particles of snow and ice as it swept by, they managed to flee from its path.

The avalanche descended a distance of only half mile from near the end of the canyon and stopped at the edge of this coal mining camp. It measured 300 feet in width.

The inhabitants are in fear of further disaster, as an unusual thaw has loosened the snow.

Immediately after the avalanche had run its course the entire population turned out with picks, shovels and sounding poles to recover those buried beneath. The three dead and three injured were all located with the sounding poles and uncovered in less than an hour.

Tariff Revision Urged in Canada.

Montreal, Que.—That the American trade between the Canadian West and the United States and the application of a new tariff bill will make for an economic division between Eastern and Western Canada was predicted by E. M. MacDonald, M. P., of Canons, N. S. Mr. MacDonald said that the situation in Canada was similar to that in the United States during and after the Civil war, and argued that a revision of the Canadian tariff in favor of the West must be made immediately if a crisis is to be avoided.

High Oil Rate Protested.

Washington, D. C.—Independent oil refineries of the territory east of the Mississippi river and north of the Ohio told the Interstate commerce commission that they virtually would be driven out of business if the general 5 per cent freight rate increase demanded by the railroads was granted.

They said the freight tariffs figured on the basis of that increase and suspended by the commission pending hearings would directly benefit the Standard Oil company at the expense of the independents.

Indianapolis, Ind.—On charges that it was an organization maintained by a detective agency for the purpose of "getting a spy into the convention," local union 979 of Peabontas, W. Va., was expelled by the convention of United Mineworkers of America. M. D. Whitehall, the delegate accredited to the union, was not present when the action was taken. The attack on the union was started by an international board member, who asserted that it was dangerous for a union member to appear near Peabontas.

Mrs. Wilson's Sister Ill.

San Francisco—Mrs. Margaret H. Elliott, sister of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, is seriously ill in her home at Berkeley. Mrs. Elliott is the wife of Professor E. H. Elliott, ex-dean of Princeton and now lecturer on international law and jurisprudence at the University of California. She is the sister of Professor Stockton Axson, of Princeton, an associate of President Wilson before he became governor of New Jersey.

Lifting Record Smashed.

Omaha—The world's amateur weight-lifting record was broken here by Arthur Rouner, an Omaha high school boy, at a meet held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. He lifted a 230-pound dumbbell above his shoulders. The former record was 215 1/2 pounds.

Crisis Believed Near In Affairs of Mexico

Washington, D. C.—Conviction in administration circles that the Huerta regime in Mexico is rapidly approaching a collapse has led to much discussion here of the nature of John Lind's frequent conferences with Mexican leaders. Belief is expressed that President Wilson's representative is surveying the situation to determine how events will shape themselves when the Huerta structure falls.

Mr. Lind's latest conference with Jesus Flores Magon and other Mexican statesmen have interested members of the diplomatic corps, who pointed out that in view of President Wilson's reiterated statements that he would not recognize Huerta nor any of the things for which he stands, the American envoy might naturally be induced to throw out hints as to what type of man would meet with approval of the White House.

So far as officials here are advised, the vicissitudes which preceded the Madero revolt and followed the downfall of that leader's stormy incumbency of the presidency have not detracted from the high standing which Francisco de la Barra, at present minister to France, attained as the man of the hour when General Diaz was forced to abdicate.

Senor de la Barra was brought forward as the leader who, as provisional president, would placate factions pending a new election. Some of the diplomats believe that de la Barra could again compose the situation in Mexico so as to permit of the choice of a successor. They regard him as the man under whose leadership all factions would be most likely to shift their activities from the battlefield to the ballot box.

Some uneasiness was occasioned at the War department by the appearance of smallpox among the Federal soldiers and refugees near El Paso, Texas, and instructions were forwarded to Brigadier General Bliss to proceed at once with the vaccination of the several thousand soldiers, as well as the women and children who crossed over into Texas after fall of Ojinaga.

The general condition of financial affairs in Mexico was summarized in this statement from the State department:

"Americans are finding the forced loans levied upon them a great burden."

The Ebano oil district in San Luis Potosi is reported to be fully controlled by the Mexican federal government, so that oils are furnished to the railroad with little interruption.

Chemical Company Is Buying Radium Lands

Washington, D. C.—Hearings before the house mines committee on bills proposing the withdrawal of radium-bearing public lands continue. Joseph Flannery, of the Standard Chemical company, admitted that his company recently closed a deal for five additional land claims in Colorado.

He denied, however, that his agents were under orders to buy all the radium claims they could "lay their hands on," and said his company now had all the claims it needed.

Charges that Dr. Howard Kelly, of Baltimore, had inspired the effort to withdraw radium lands "to divert attention from himself" were made by O. Barlow Willmarth, head of two radium mining companies of Colorado. Fears of monopolization of radium ores, Willmarth said, were groundless.

Thomas Curran, who said his family owned and operated 70 claims in Colorado, told the committee that doubt as to Dr. Kelly's humane motives was not possible.

Cancer Patient Improves With Radium Treatment

Washington, D. C.—Representative Robert G. Bremner, of New Jersey, who is being treated with radium for cancer in a Baltimore hospital, is improving slowly. The representative's sister, after visiting him, announced that he was in a better condition than at any time since he submitted to the radium treatment.

Paris Food Prices Soar.

Paris—The extraordinary cold weather experienced here during the last four weeks, and which shows no signs of abating, has caused the price of food in Paris to rise from 50 to 600 per cent above the ordinary. Potatoes bring nearly double their usual price, while fresh vegetables cost from four to six times their regular prices. Railway communication is interrupted by snow, which is from two to four feet deep in some places.

Central France the temperature is from 10 to 20 degrees below freezing.
