THREE ENGINEERS FOR DALLES PROJECT

The Dalles power project committee will use three engineers in investigating Five-Mile rapids on the Columbia river to determine the power possibilities, according to an announcement made by State Engineer Lewis, who is a member of the committee. says a Salem dispatch to the Portland Telegram. This committee was appointed by the last legislature and will report its findings to the next.

E. G. Hopson, supervising engineer for the reclamation service in Oregon, will be the supervising engineer, representing both the secretary of the interior and the committee. He has recommended that L. F. Harza of Portland be appointed to perform the investigation proper and the state engineer says that he believes that he will be appointed at the committee's next meeting. William E. Morris of Portland has already been appointed to specially represent the committee, and his chief work, according to the state engineer, will be to report to the committee on the progress of the work.

Rev. J. G. Tate preached a very interesting and practical sermon at the Immanuel church, last Sunday evening, to a large audience. His text was: "Make straight the path." He said it was the duty of every one to so live that his life would be a help, not a hindrance, to his fellow man. He denounced a religion that was assumed Sunday morning in a cloak, and cast aside Sunday night.
