A SUGGESTION.

The Mosier public realizes that there are a number of improvements which are much needed and which can be made without a great expenditure of money. One of these is the completion of the boat landing. It is well known that this matter has reached a certain stage which is between "something and nothing." Money has been subscribed, part of it collected, and a float has been purchased and paid for. The lumber for the boat house bought at the same time, is not yet paid for, and the people want their money and should have it. It is up to those who have subscribed and have not as yet paid, to come through with the cash, so that the matter can be settled and the work completed. We all know that a boat landing will be a great benefit to the Mosier public. We know also, that those who have paid in their good money which they subscribed have felt that it was wasted, as nothing has resulted.

Now then, it has been suggested, that as February 22nd, is a general holiday, the citizens of Mosier and vicinity who have promised work on the road make a holiday at that time and get out in a body and build the boat house and do as much work on the road as possible. As the 22nd falls on Sunday, it is customary to observe the following day as a holiday. Therefore Monday or Tuesday, as seems best, should be set apart as a day to get together and push this work.

We would suggest that all those in favor of this plan should leave word personally or by card with E. A. Race at the lumber yard. This is an important matter and the people should be interested enough to turn out in force.

MOSIER AND COLUMBIA RIVER HIGHWAY

EDITOR BULLETIN:

The writer wishes to take exceptions to an article which appeared in the Evening Telegram of Portland, wherein said article boosted for the F. P. Friday road up Hood River Valley via Neil creek to The Dalles farming district—a link in the Columbia River Highway. This article stated that the county court of Wasco county favored said route as it would send or bring the tourist through the farming district of Wasco county. But the most unkind statement, and absolutely false statement, was that the Columbia River Highway would thus escape the sand dunes between Hood River and The Dalles by adopting the Friday road. Now we must admit that the sand dunes do exist in so far as any effort on the part of the citizens of the Mosier district is concerned, so far as the writer has been able to learn. No one from our district has ever attended any of the good roads meetings to place our position before that body, and as a matter of fact, I doubt if any of the Columbia River Highway officials have ever been over the route from Hood River to The Dalles, for if they had they would be doing as much talking and writing regarding our unexcelled scenery and easy grades. The most imposing stretch of Nature's grandest efforts—unbiased opinion of far traveled men—lies between Hood River and The Dalles. And further, as I take it, the Columbia River Highway is essentially a scenic route. But it must terminate at Hood River, where the tourist would see the wonder land of this great United States.

Neither Hood River nor any other place can succeed in a selfish way. The Mosier district is unfortunately bottled up so far as easy ingress and egress by wagon road is concerned, and nowhere in Oregon should the spirit of unity for the construction of the highway be more in evidence than here in our district. It would mean practically a water grade to and from the east and west to our door. The Telegram article referred to, written from Hood River, says:

Interest has been revived here in what has been known for years as the Friday road, being a suggestion by F. P. Friday that the county build a road up river reaching a point seven miles out in the valley with no grade greater than 3 per cent. From this trunk line branches would eventually lead to the different sections of the valley, by means of the creek canyons leading off from the river. The suggestion has been made that the Columbia River Highway take this course and go to The Dalles through The Dalles Pass rather than up the Columbia river, and the Wasco county court has favored the mountain route, as by it parties would pass through the farming section of Wasco county, instead of through the sand dunes along the river. At Hood River the sentiment favors the pass route because auto parties will want to see Hood River Valley and Mt. Hood somewhere along the route, and only by leaving the river at Hood River town can this be done. Again the Columbia scenery from here to The Dalles is a succession of bare hills, where the pass route leads through a charming country.

The writer has great faith in the chief officials of Wasco county and fully believes they were misquoted. And further believes that when the time is ripe for definite action on the greatest project of our life as residents of Wasco county—the Columbia River Highway—they will be ready and willing to do their part. But we, as somewhat of an important part of Wasco county, should in some way show that we are heartily in accord with the Columbia River Highway and do everything in our power to assist our county officials in this matter.

down town after supper and do a little trading, but perhaps it does not occur to the customer that he might just as easily buy his goods earlier in the day, or that he is keeping the business man behind his counter when he would prefer to be at home with his family, or enjoying himself in some recreation. Very few country people are in town after six o'clock at any time of the year, and when they do come in they can get their trading done early. So it has been only for the convenience of the town people that the stores have been kept open. These people have all day to do their trading in, so there is no excuse for keeping open later than 6:30.
