Notice to Parents.

A portion of the postal law is here quoted for their benefit: Sec. 280. Post offices shall not be allowed to become resorts for loungers or disorderly persons, or the scene of disputes or controversies. Smoking may be prohibited in the lobbies. Whenever necessary postmasters should call on the civil authorities to preserve order and if they refuse to do so, the office may be closed. All offenses are punishable by fine and imprisonment which will be carried out to the fullest extent. This warning will not be repeated.

MOTHER NATURE IN TRAVEL.
