O. L. PAQUET OUT FOR SHERIFF

O. L. Paquet, candidate on the republican ticket for the office of sheriff of this county, was in town Wednesday, introducing himself to the voters.

Mr. Paquet is a native Oregonian, and has lived in Wasco county for the last 38 years, at Wapinitia, where he is engaged in farming. He is better known to the old timers of Wasco county, having been assessor for the county 25 years ago, when the county embraced about 60 square miles - when it took seven months of hard riding to assess the property.

Mr. Paquet, in an interview with the Bulletin man, stated that the reason for his coming out for the office of sheriff was that the southern part of the county had not been represented at the county seat for 25 years and that his section of the county feels that it should be represented by some office, and Mr. Paquet's friends are therefore making an effort in his behalf.
