DANISH MARKET FOR APPLES

The Export Department of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, which is making a comprehensive study of the World markets for Northwestern apples and has collaterally secured information as to the consumption and importation into foreign countries of various kinds of fruit has ascertained that--The apple trees in Denmark number about 5,434,000, but the production is not large enough to supply the home demand, as evidenced by the fact that the importation in 1909 (the latest available statistics) amounted to 39,234 barrels, of which the United States supplied direct 7,822. It seems, however, that considerable quantities of American apples are also imported from Hamburg and other German and British ports, and on the other hand some are also exported to Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia. We are informed that the prices for the York and Baldwin varieties average \$3.50 exclusive of brokerage and that some Winesaps have sold as high as \$4.30 to \$5.00. The varieties of boxed apples imported from the United States are Winesaps, Jonathans, and Lauvers. The public seems to prefer the red apples. The American Consul is of the opinion that the California Newtown Pippin are the most popular and that the Wenatchee apples that have been shipped are too large for the market.

The terms of payment are as a rule cash through a Copenhagen bank after inspection of the goods. In cases of consignments the payment is effected by checks soon as the sale has taken place.

So great has been the demand for seed corn in Oregon this Spring that the available supply has been exhausted and the O. W. R. & N. Co. has been obliged to pick up odd lots wherever they could find them in order to supply the great number of farmers applying for seed. Farmer Smith states that other sections of the Northwest are afflicted with the corn growing fever and that indications point to a record-breaking crop this year.

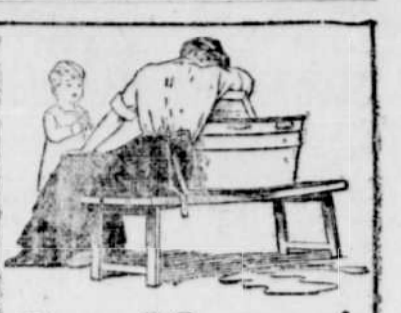
