COLUMBIA HIGHWAY BOOSTERS VISIT MOSIER

ARE CHARMED WITH COUNTRY AND BEAUTIFUL SCENERY

S. Benson and son, good roads enthusiasts of Portland, and J. F. Carroll, editor of the Portland Evening Telegram, spent a few hours in Mosier last Tuesday on their way to the Deschutes River on a fishing trip. The trio, in company with J. K. McGregor, visited a number of the fine orchards and residences in the vicinity and were charmed with the high state of cultivation in which the orchards are kept, the prospects of a bumper fruit crop, the substantial appearance of prosperity on every hand, and the unsurpassed beauty and grandeur of our scenery. So pleased were they that they registered a vow to return in the near future and enjoy Mac's hospitality and a few days' trout fishing in Mosier Creek.
We have said that Mr. Benson, Sr., is an enthusiast on the subject of good roads, and the immense benefit they will be to the state. He proves his faith by his works. It will be remembered that he gave \$10,000 for the building of the Columbia River Highway around Shell Rock mountain, and it is his dream to see the highway completed in the near future. If this is accomplished it will be largely due to his untiring efforts.
It was Mr. Benson's belief that it would be possible to connect Mosier and Hood River with a water grade road and that the physical obstructions could be easily overcome. Certain it is that if the state and the counties, and the other believers in good roads generally and the Columbia River Highway particularly, bring as much effort and influence to bear upon the project as Mr. Benson has done and is doing, the highway will be an assured fact before long.

MOSIER WILL HAVE MORE LIGHTS

At an adjourned regular meeting of the common council, held Wednesday evening, it was decided to install twelve additional street lights. These lights will be placed on corners and at various points on the different roads where most needed. One of the places to be served is at the falls on The Dalles road, a dangerous place on a dark night.
The council, which concurred in the matter with but one dissenting vote, is to be commended in thus safeguarding the public and giving the town a better light service.
