SUMMONS
In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Wasco County.

OTTO MILLATT and WILHEMINA MILLATT,

To Otto Millatt and Wilhemina Millatt, defendants:
In the Name of the State of Oregon, you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, on or before the 20th day of June, 1914, and if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead thereto, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in his complaint, to-wit: For judgment against you, the said Otto Millatt and Wilhemina Millatt, for the sum of \$500.00, together with interest thereon from February 3rd, 1913, at the rate of 8 per cent per annum; for the further sum of \$75.00 attorney fees; for the further sum of \$5.05, together with interest thereon from April 29th, 1914, at the rate of 6 per cent per annum; and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements herein and accruing costs; and for a decree of the Court decreeing that the mortgage described in said complaint be foreclosed and the premises therein described, to-wit: Lots "C" and "D" in Block Ten (10) in the Fort Dalles Military Reservation in Dalles City, Wasco County, Oregon, together with the appurtenances thereto, be sold in the manner provided by law for the sale of real property upon mortgage foreclosure, and the proceeds arising from such sale be applied in the payment of said judgment and any and all sums found to be due plaintiff herein, and that the defendants and each and all of them and any and all persons claiming by, through or under them, be barred, forever, from any and all right, title, interest or equity in said premises, save only the statutory right of redemption; that execution issue herein; and that the purchaser of said premises at said sale be placed in immediate possession thereof; and for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem meet and equitable.
