He was backed by a number of our business men and they got busy on Tuesday with subscription papers and by night they had over \$207 subscribed--most of it in town, the rock crusher boys kicking in with \$95 of it. The country has not been called on yet, but it is known that the local grange is heartily in accord with the movement and we can pull off one of the biggest celebrating stunts ever held in the (Mosier) Northwest. At a meeting of the commercial club held Monday night, it was decided to have a celebration instead of a community picnic, as was at first figured on, and various committees were appointed to look after the different features of the celebration. The details of course have not been worked out yet, but they will appear later in these columns.

ORTLEY PEOPLE MAKE GOOD
For the second time the Ortlely Vaudeville Company demonstrated their ability as first class entertainers, when they presented "Mr. Bob" to a large audience in Chown's Hall, on Wednesday evening. Everything was good, from first to last--the opening numbers on the piano by Mrs. J. H. Gault, the personification of the Jew and the Devil by Messrs Faust and Firebaugh, the poke in the short ribs administered to some of Mosier's local luminaries by Mitt and Jeff, and the histrionic excellence of the entire cast of "Mr. Bob." There was not a cabbage or an ancient egg in evidence during the performance, but plenty of appreciative applause. Mosier has often paid more for far less interesting entertainments than the Ortlely Co. put up, and they will be warmly welcomed whenever they return. At the close of the performance the floor was cleared and a few hours of dancing was enjoyed.

WILL MACADAMIZE COUNTY ROAD
The ten-ton road roller belonging jointly to Wasco county and The Dalles, arrived Monday, with the water and oil carts. They are being used this week on the county road between Mosier and Mayevale. This road is being built by the county and Mr. Mayer on a dollar-for-dollar basis. It is 24 feet wide and will be well graveled and oiled. When finished it will be perhaps the finest piece of road along the Columbia Highway, of which it will form a link.

EVANGELIST TO LECTURE HERE
Mrs. R. W. Peterson, the Denver evangelist, began a series of ten lectures last night in the Christian Church. On next Monday and Tuesday evenings her lectures on Rescue and Slum work in Denver will be illustrated by stereopticon views. Mrs. Peterson comes highly recommended as a conscientious Christian worker. She was for twenty years a worker in the slums of Denver, Col. and for the past ten years has been an interdenominational evangelist. The public is cordially invited to attend this series of meetings.

GRANGE RALLY DAY TOMORROW
Tomorrow is Rally Day for the Morier Grange and all members and their friends are earnestly requested to be present. Prof. W. S. Brown, Extension Horticulturist at the Oregon Agricultural College, will speak on the value of fruit and vegetable by-products and the necessity of establishing factories for making this disposal of inferior and surplus products. A preliminary survey of the field will be made by the speaker, who will then deal with local as well as general conditions. Professor Brown has studied this matter widely and many of his observations are set forth in a bulletin recently prepared by him in collaboration with Prof. Lewis. Prof. Brown is also a member of the committee on by-products factories appointed at the Spokane National Apple show, to investigate and report districts in which factories could profitably be erected. His subject is full of interest and will be presented in an attractive and understandable form.

MOSIER VS. HEIGHTS
The Mosier ball players, thinking they were going out to saw wood or pick berries, brought out a few ball players and made up the rest of their team with saw logs, throttle pullers and six foot-timbers.
