**TOP PRICES FOR WOOL AT SHANIKO**

On June 4 more than 1,000,000 pounds of wool was sold at Shaniko, at prices ranging from 16 1/2 to 20 1-8 cents per pound. The wool was practically all taken by five buyers, one of whom bought 480,000 pounds. The largest individual sale was 77,000 pounds at 18 3-4 cents.

**SUMMONS**

To Otto Millatt and Wilhemina Millatt, defendants:
