CAMPAIGN FOR RIVER ROAD IS AUSPICIOUSLY BEGUN

Since S. Benson, of Portland, has guaranteed that the proposed bond issue of \$75,000 would open the Columbia River Highway through this county, sentiment in favor of the project has been greatly strengthened and it is the general belief that the bond issue, when submitted, will carry by a good majority, says the Hood River News. At a meeting held at Library hall, Saturday evening, delegates from all parts of the valley met to exchange views and to report the sentiment in their sections. Some strong talks in favor of the road were made and the gathering adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, The completion of the Columbia River Highway in time for the 1915 travel to and from the San Francisco exposition is of the greatest importance to Hood River, and,
Whereas, This can only be accomplished by the immediate voting of a bond issue of \$75,000 to open the Columbia River road through Hood River county, and
Whereas, The benefits to be derived for the prosperity of Hood River county from this immediate action will warrant putting aside all other road matters of whatever nature for the present, and
Whereas, If we are to expect state aid in the construction of this road Hood River must show an inclination to do her share, therefore
Be it resolved, That it is the sentiment of this meeting that the county court of Hood River county be petitioned to call an election at once for the aforesaid bond issue.

A conference was held Monday at Multnomah Falls between a delegation from this county and state and officials of that county. Those from here included Judge Stanton, Commissioner Hawkes, Truman Butler, E. W. Sweaney, Roy D. Smith, C. W. Hooker, Chris Dethman and District Attorney Derby. Those whom they met included Governor West, Secretary of State Olcott, State Treasurer Kay, State Highway Engineer Bowley, S. Benson, Sam Hill, J. B. Yeon and others.

At Saturday's meeting here, C. W. Hooker presided and called for the election of a chairman, R. H. Wallace was chosen and C. W. Hooker made secretary. M. R. Noble and Mr. Fletcher thought some provision should also be made for improving that part of the road this side of Viento, but it was stated that all Hood River is expected to do is to appropriate the \$75,000 for the opening of the road. Further improvements will come from the state or other sources, it was intimated.

L. E. Dart made a strong talk in favor of the bond issue. He spoke from experience of the value of good roads and the tourist trade to California. "The tourist crop is the best on earth," declared Mr. Dart, "and will mean even more to this valley than the apple crop. We have the scenery, the climate and all the other attractions. Let's not bottle them up any more, but reap the benefits."

A. C. Staten spoke of the value of getting some financial leaven for the valley in the way of ready cash. He said that the tourists would fill this need. He gave some estimates of the number who would visit here and declared that the income derived therefrom would do much to tide over the bad crop years and place the county on a prosperous financial basis. He declared that this is the urgent need of the valley. Several other speakers expressed themselves along the same line.

INTERESTING HISTORICAL RELIC

Thru the courtesy of Mrs. E. L. Root, we had the pleasure to examine this week a copy of an old newspaper, published at Kingston, Ulster county, N. Y., and dated January 4, 1800. It will be remembered that George Washington died on December 14, 1799, at the age of 68 years. The paper contains a notice of his death and an obituary; also a beautiful eulogy to the dead patriot, statesman and ex-president; also sheriff's sales of all sorts of things, including "negro wench-ess," etc. The paper is printed with old style type, which makes it difficult for the uninitiated to read. It is likewise discovered that human nature was the same in those days as it is today, with all its frailties, as we notice that one man had refused to pay any bills contracted by his naughty wife.

The paper has been in the possession of Mrs. Root's family--the Kents--for a good many years, having been acquired by her father, who was a soldier in the Rebellion, and is treasured as an heirloom and historical relic. We naturally reverence

anything ancient, unless, perhaps, it is old clothes. Some day in the dim distance, it is possible that Mosier's posterity will exhibit with reverence and awe the first copy of the Mosier Bulletin--who can say? And who among our subscribers has preserved a copy? What a pleasure it will be for us to look down (or up) from our prairie abode and see the future citizens of Mosier--say about 2014--take from a glass case a copy of the Bulletin, carefully preserved, and read with veneration the chronicles of that long ago when Mosier was in its infancy.
