ORDINANCE NO. 5

An Ordinance prohibiting the firing of firecrackers, bombs, skyrockets or other explosives within the City of Mosier.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Mosier:

SECTION 1. That no person or persons shall explode or fire or cause to be exploded or fired any species of firearms (except in cases of necessity) or fire or explode any firecrackers, bombs, skyrockets or other explosives within the City of Mosier, excepting in that portion of the city lying North of the O-W. R. & N. Co.'s right-of-way.

SECTION 2. Any person or persons violating any portion of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof before the Recorder's Court shall be fined not less than one dollar or more than fifty dollars, or imprisoned for not less than one day or more than twenty days, or both, for each offense and the Court shall adjudge the offender to pay costs of prosecution, and it shall be the duty of the marshal to see that the provisions of this ordinance are enforced and to make complaint in the Recorder's Court of all violations thereof.

Passed the Council this 10th day of June, 1914.

ASTORIA REGATTA FOR 1914

Astoria, Ore., June 18—Astoria will extend the hand of welcome on July 2, 3 and 4, 1914, not only to visitors from distant points of the Pacific Northwest, but in particular to its neighboring communities of the lower Columbia, Grays Harbor, Willapa Harbor, the Cowlitz and Chehalis valleys, Tillamook, Nehalem, etc. In fact, through its regatta committee, the city extends a cordial invitation to all the people of these communities to unite in the 19th Annual regatta to be held on the dates above mentioned.

Great interest is manifested in this great aquatic event by outside communities this year, and Admiral Phil Metschan, Jr., of the Imperial hotel, Portland, expects to have at least 300 members on his personal staff, representing all parts of the Northwest. The committee is leaving nothing undone to provide amusements of all kinds for all classes of people, both on land and water. They have a number of new speed boats already entered for the big Pacific Coast championship speed boat races, some of which are now under construction with a guaranteed speed of not less than 50 miles per hour. The famous "Oregon Kid II," the "Oregon Wolf IV," and the "Seattle Ballet," are among the entries; also a fast boat from Raymond, Washington, and one from Sacramento. But these are just the "first-comers." It is expected that the Astoria regatta this year will witness the largest number of races and the greatest ever held on the Pacific Coast.

In addition to these premier events, there will be sailing and rowing races, water and land sports of all kinds, a grand illuminated marine parade and pyrotechnic display on the Columbia river, and a mammoth land parade and patriotic demonstration on July 4th. E. J. Arnold's big carnival company, with dog and pony shows, Ferris wheel, merry-go-round, etc., three large brass bands, country dances, and fancy dress balls, will fill in every minute not otherwise occupied. Reduced rates will prevail on all railroads and water lines.
