ROAD WORK PROGRESSING
The work on the county road between Mosier and Mayerdale is progressing in fine shape, tho it is a much bigger undertaking than the promoters anticipated. One thing is certain--when finished it will be the smoothest and best built country road in Eastern Oregon, and the finest link in the Columbia River Highway connecting eastern and Western Oregon.

This stretch of county road, about a mile and a quarter in length, reaches from Mayerdale, the palatial country home of Mark A. Mayer, to a point just west of the F. A. Shogren ranch, and when completed will be as smooth as a pavement, with a grade not to exceed two per cent. The roadway is 24 feet wide, with a graveled roadbed of 16 feet. An auto truck from Portland is hauling about 80 yards of gravel per day from rock crusher west of town. The first layer of gravel about 6 inches thick, is being rolled by the ten-ton roller owned jointly by the county and Dalles City. A second layer of the same thickness will be put on, rolled and then oiled.

This fine piece of road is made possible by the generosity of County Judge F. S. Gunning and Commissioners H. C. Rooper and F. C. Clausen, and the following citizens of Mosier and those having interests here:

Mark A. Mayer, who inaugurated the movement; W. H. Weber, F. A. Shogren, Dr. Robinson, R. D. Chatfield, Morton and Algersheimer, the Misses M. and A. Shogren, Mrs. Wm. Johnson, C. C. Isom, J. M. Leiter, of Portland, H. M. West, O. E. Wilson and J. N. Mosier.

This road, running east from Mosier along the bluff overlooking the Columbia river, will be from a scenic view one of the most beautiful drives along the entire route from Portland to The Dalles and will be a delight to the tourist.

LEAGUE TO BACK OREGON INDUSTRIES
Portland, Ore., June 23 (Special)—A new organization, The Oregon Industry League, has recently been formed in Portland, the object of which is to conduct an educational campaign for the extension of the use of Oregon-made goods of all kinds, for the encouragement of all lines of industry in this state and for the moral and financial backing of all Oregon institutions.

L. Samuel, for many years prominent as a leader on the movement for the support of Oregon industries, has been elected as president of the organization. The campaign will be carried on through publications in the state, and the league may in time establish an official publication of its own. Meetings of all kinds, where the league can properly send its speakers will be covered and all large conventions in the state will be attended by its delegates. Twenty-one leading civic and commercial organizations of the city and state sent delegates to assist in the establishment of the new league and it is to bring to its assistance practically every organization of importance in the state.

The business men and all citizens of Mosier should begin to make preparations for decorating for the Fourth. Bunting and flags can be had in abundance at our stores. Give the town a festive appearance for the occasion.

"MADE IN WASCO" BANQUET

The spacious dining room at Hotel Dalles was filled to overflowing Wednesday evening at the "Made in Wasco" banquet given by the Ladies' Aid Society of the Congregational church. An elegant dinner was served, consisting entirely of products of Wasco county, the guests being waited on by some of the fairest of Wasco county's daughters.

E. R. Hill, secretary of the Business Men's Association, presided as toastmaster and in his happy manner introduced the speakers of the evening. Mayor J. E. Anderson gave the address of welcome, and was followed by Mrs. Edith Tozier Wethered, who is well known throughout the State and United States as an Oregon Booster. Mrs. Wethered's theme was "Patronizing Oregon Industries," and she handled it in a convincing and masterful manner. If there was no one present who felt ashamed of patronizing Eastern mail-order houses and other out-of-Oregon industries, he should have been after listening to her talk.

Mr. Horace D. Ramsdell, president of the Portland Commercial club, and R. W. Raymond, manager of the Manufacturers Association of Oregon, spoke along the lines of Oregon's development, emphasizing the fact that while Portland and other Oregon cities were contributing to public benevolences for Oregon's unemployed, Oregon was sending her good money out of the state for commodities which could and should be supplied at home, thus giving employment to idle thousands.

By special request, Prof. E. C. Roberts, president of the State Board of Horticulture, spoke on the beauty, or pearl light—a most interesting talk to horticulturists.

Solos sung by Miss Mildred Bettingen and Mr. Frank Sexton received enthusiastic applause. The occasion was certainly a most enjoyable one and will tend to unite the various sections of the county in closer bonds of business and social unity.
