WORLD MARKET ON NORTHWEST FRUIT

This year the fruit growers of the Northwest will have the world for a market under their own control, operating through their own hired men, for the first time. The scheme of adequate distribution is being worked out on a mammoth scale, and is proceeding just as fast as the volume of tonnage will justify. Although of course Northwest fruits do not find their way to all available home markets, as yet, but are being rapidly extended to them in a more systematic manner than ever before, the fruit-grower-trustees of the North Pacific Fruit Distributors have decided to enter the European field on the same basis as they established themselves in the North American markets during the past year. They considered it necessary to begin this pioneering now to prepare an additional outlet for the great crop which the big fruit acreage of the Northwest will produce within a few years.

S. B. Moomaw, a former Virginian and orchard owner who was the Distributors sales agent in London, England, last year, was recently formally employed as European general agent, a foreign office being permanently established in the British metropolis, and arrangements are also being made for a salaried man at Hamburg, Germany, who will be under Mr. Moomaw's direction. Last year the London office paid for itself, this year with an enlarged scope, it is expected to do even better. Regular reports of foreign market conditions are one feature of the incidental benefits. During 1913, through its London Agent, the Distributors shipped apples to 16 cities in 10 European countries as follows: London, Liverpool and Manchester in England; Glasgow in Scotland; Hamburg and Bremen in Germany; Paris in France; Christian and Bergen in Norway; Stockholm, Gutenberg and Malmo in Sweden; Copenhagen in Denmark; Rotterdam in Holland; Antwerp in Belgium and Helsingfors in Finland. This season it will export to many additional points.

The Distributors is moving conservatively in its European extension work, depending in a large measure upon the amount of tonnage being pledged by the Northwestern growers. If this is sufficient, President H. F. Davidson will be sent to Europe to investigate new markets next fall. The Distributors will also cover the Chinese and Japanese markets as soon as justified. Direct shipments through the Spokane headquarters were made to South America, South Africa, Australia and the Philippines last year. This trade also will be increased and broadened during 1914, as tonnage developments warrant.

It is stated that the 1914 wool crop brought Oregon \$2,080,000.

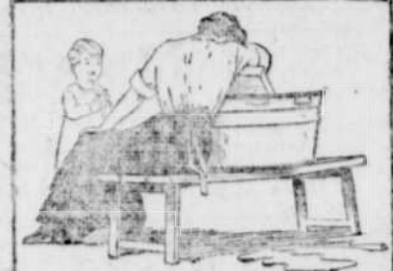
