Linn County Keeps Busy.
Albany—Beginning next Thursday, public events of great interest will be in progress in Linn County practically continuously for almost a month. During that time four big events will take place in three different cities.
The annual Linn County Pioneers' picnic, always a big event in this part of the state, was held at Brownsville from June 25 to June 27, inclusive. On June 25 the Strawberry City Chautauqua opened at Lebanon and will continue its sessions for several days.

\$20,000 School Assured.
Amity—The board of education will let a contract next week for the erection of a \$15,000 high school building, which is to be completed in time for use this fall. The bond issue of \$20,000 at 5 1/2 per cent has been purchased by the Lumbermen's Trust company of Portland. The construction of the building will be of wood stucco and contain four classrooms, two laboratories and assembly room. It will accommodate 260 students.

Crater Lake Travel On.
Medford—Several parties have gone to Crater Lake recently, and in a few days it will be possible to reach the rim with an automobile. A new record for arrivals at Arant's camp has already been made this season, 298 having registered. Last year at this time only nine had registered. Superintendent Steele predicts 1914 will establish a new record for tourist travel to this unique natural wonder.

Outlook for State Fair Is Exceedingly Good

Salem—Announcement was made this week by Frank Meredith, secretary, that the coming State Fair would have the largest livestock and poultry exhibits in its history. He said that all the owners exhibiting last year would be represented and that the 13 large stock barns would be filled earlier than usual.
Many stockmen of Eastern states, anticipating the benefit to be derived from having exhibits at the Panama-Pacific exposition, will exhibit at the Oregon and other state fairs, remaining on the Coast until the close of the exposition at San Diego.
Mr. Meredith said that all the space in the machinery building had been engaged, and that the fair board exhibiting which have not engaged room will have to provide their own quarters. The pavilion, now in the course of construction, will be 243 by 120 feet, having an auditorium annex 55 by 100 feet. The agricultural products will be displayed on the lower floor, while the displays of the Oregon Manufacturers' association will be on the second floor. Mr. Meredith said the auditorium would have a seating capacity of 1000.
The old pavilion will not be razed, as was reported, but will be devoted to the children's industrial exhibits, which was one of the features of the fair last year. The eugenics department will be in this building, as will the display of the Oregon Library commission.
According to the management the poultry exhibit this year will be 20 per cent larger than that of 1913. A Tacoma chicken fancier has written that he will enter 200 birds.
A boys' camp will be maintained at the grounds this year, the fair board to have as its guests two boys from each county. The boys will be the winners in local and district industrial fairs. The Vancouver Interstate Fair board has announced that it will send one of the state prize winners in industrial contests to the Oregon State Fair.

Expert Says Clover Seed Crop Threatened by Midge

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis—Farmers are urged to examine their clover seed crop carefully at this time for presence of the clover seed midge. If the heads appear blighted or brown and do not come out in full bloom, one may be reasonably sure the midge is present, says A. L. Lovett, assistant entomologist. If this proves to be true the crop should be cut at once for hay.
Where the presence of the midge is suspected some of the browned heads, pull them apart and split open the individual seed capsule and examine carefully for a small salmon pink maggot. This maggot is the larva of the clover seed midge. It feeds in the unfertilized seed ovule and prevents normal blooming and the production of seed. By cutting the crop at once the maggots will dry up in the cured hay and be unable to mature.
No remedial measures are known for the midge. The standard control measure is to change slightly the normal time of heading of the seed crop.

Oregon Hindu Students Make Decided Protest

Corvallis—The Hindu Student society of the Oregon Agricultural college, in special session Wednesday, adopted resolutions protesting to Count Okuma, premier of Japan, against the clearing of the Japanese steamship Kamagata Maru from Victoria, B. C., where the Hindus are contending with the immigration authorities that a hearing in the court of British Columbia will give them authority to land at the Canadian port. The resolutions as adopted are:
"Whereas, The Hindus on the steamship Kamagata Maru demand only to stay on their chartered vessel to test their rights in the British court at Victoria, and
"Whereas, The Japanese captain, in conspiracy with Canadian immigration officials who desire to avoid the test case unjustly, wants to embark the steamer and deny legal rights to the Hindus;
"Be it resolved, That the Hindus in North America cable protest to Count Okuma, Premier of Japan, founder and ex-president of the Indo-Japanese Association of Japan, asking his good services to see that the Japanese steamer Kamagata Maru shall not leave Victoria until the case is decided in the Canadian court, because it will deprive the Hindus the right of habeas corpus and because any high-handed action on the part of the Japanese steamship captain may be detrimental to Japanese commercial interests with \$15,000,000 of people in India.
"Be it further resolved, That these resolutions be communicated to all Hindu centers in North America."

Uncle Sam Turned Down.

Newport—Uncle Sam's credit has good backing in Newport. The Abbey House has issued an O. K. to government bills. This is the result of G. A. Aronson, a hardware dealer, refusing to allow J. W. Maupin, United States engineer, who is surveying Yaquina harbor, to have a piece of pipe, except for cash. He refused a government voucher on the ground that the government is too hard to collect from. The Abbey House came to the assistance of Mr. Maupin, a visitor at the hotel, and an O. K. was given his account.

July Wheat Deliveries Bring Fancy Prices

Pendleton—More than 200,000 bushels of the 1914 wheat crop have been sold in this city in the past two days, at prices far in advance of those offered at this time last year. Farmers contracting for July delivery are to receive 71 cents per bushel, while those contracting for August delivery are to receive 70 cents.
Harvest operations already have started in the light land sections, the first barley of the season being delivered to a warehouse in Pilot Rock. This is the earliest date on record in Umatilla county. The wheat harvest will be general throughout the county within two weeks. The crop will be about 90 per cent normal.

Bond Issue Is Opposed.

Hood River—An active campaign against the proposed Columbia River bond issue of \$75,000 has been begun by A. I. Mason, defeated candidate on the Republican ticket for representative from Hood River and Wasco counties. Mr. Mason declares that not a cent should be expended until the local roads are improved. Mr. Mason has issued a challenge to all who desire to mark him on the road question. S. W. Stark, a local attorney, has accepted the challenge, and a series of debates will be held.

Chemists Are Shifted.

University of Oregon, Eugene—The University of Oregon has secured the services of Professor W. P. Morgan, of Reed College, to take charge of the department of chemistry for this year's summer school. Professor O. F. Stafford was suddenly drafted for important government work, and the other members of the regular faculty in chemistry happen, also, to have contracted for their time during the summer. Professor Morgan will be in charge of the chemistry work during the entire summer term of six weeks.

Stuffed Cabbage and Pork.
Take a small firm white cabbage, clean and wash in between the leaves without breaking apart, put in water and boil for 15 minutes. Take out and very carefully turn back the leaves and curl under until the center is open. Then very carefully put in a stuffing of raw, chopped pork (fresh pork). Lay in a little, then lay leaves back, then a little more, then turn back more leaves and season, until cabbage is all filled. Then carefully put the cabbage back into the cloth it was first boiled in, bring corners together and fasten securely. Put back into boiling water and boil again for 50 minutes or an hour. Then remove carefully from cloth, pour over it a rich cream or egg sauce and serve hot. Also nice cold. Veal can be used in place of pork.

Potato Rusk.
Mix one cupful of mashed white potatoes, one cupful of granulated sugar, one yeast cake, softened in lukewarm water, or one cupful of liquid yeast; two eggs, well beaten; one cupful of milk and one-half cupful of flour. Let stand in a warm place until light. Then mix in one-half cupful of soft butter, flour enough to make a soft dough, and one-half cupful of raisins or currants. Let rise; then form into long rolls about three inches in length and one inch thick. Set in a greased pan to rise and bake about 20 minutes in a moderate oven.
