The cup will be engraved as follows: "Presented by His Imperial Majesty William II, Emperor of Germany, to the winner of the Sonderklasse Race held under the auspices of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, April 1915." President Woodrow Wilson and King George V have offered cups for two other events of the regatta. The races will be held in San Francisco harbor.
