BIG FIRE NEAR THE DALLES

Starting Saturday evening at the head of Chenoweth creek, where are the large ranch holdings of D. P. Ketchum and Jesse Hostetler used for sheep pasture, fire swept over grass and thru timber that night and Sunday in the Chenoweth creek valley and on the hills each side southwest of The Dalles, and Monday afternoon a call came from ranchers on the Chenoweth creek road to send out fire fighters, and many automobile loads of men went out to view the scene and help if necessary, while Judge Gunning sent out about 20 men, says The Dalles Optimist.

Large numbers of ranchers in the affected district were fighting fire all night Saturday and had it well in hand, but with the west wind which came up Sunday morning fanning into flames smoldering fires in stumps and fallen trees, the fire began to run again and swept through the timber in the valley and over the summit of the hill back of the Chenoweth road many times, catching down the sides of the bluff, burning down almost to the brick yard and the I. O. O. F. cemetery until the smoke and cinders dropped with alarming frequency in The Dalles.

The fire swept over an area of between 12 and 15 square miles and a conservative estimate of losses sustained is \$25,000. It is a calamity indeed to that section, for most of the settlers are new comers who were working hard to improve their property and have not accumulated a large amount of surplus cash.

COUNTY JAIL COMPLETED

The jail in the new court house has been completed and accepted by Judge Frank S. Gunning and the county commissioners, says the Chronicle. The contractor, the Pauley Jail Building Company of St. Louis, has received its money. The job is declared to be a very fine one and the Pauley people will use it as an exhibit of the class of work they do. It is said to be the best county jail in Oregon.

DESCHUTES COUNTY MAY BE FORMED

As the result of an unanimous vote at the meeting of the Bend Commercial Club at its meeting Saturday, steps will be taken at once to obtain signers to a petition for the formation of a new county to be called Deschutes county, out of the southwestern portion of Crook county. Already the residents of the north end of the county have a petition signed by over 800, asking for the formation of Jefferson county out of their section of Crook, and now the Bend section is following suit.

As at present constituted Crook county is larger than the state of New Jersey, and because of its size and lack of transportation facilities, county expenses are high and results unsatisfactory. The county is naturally divided by the separate interests of the three parts, and local jealousies hinder improvements that each section feels in need of. On the division proposed each part will have a good sized territory and be better able to care for its own interests than at present.

The petitions will be voted on at the general election in November. The question of permanent county seat will not be passed on until 1916.

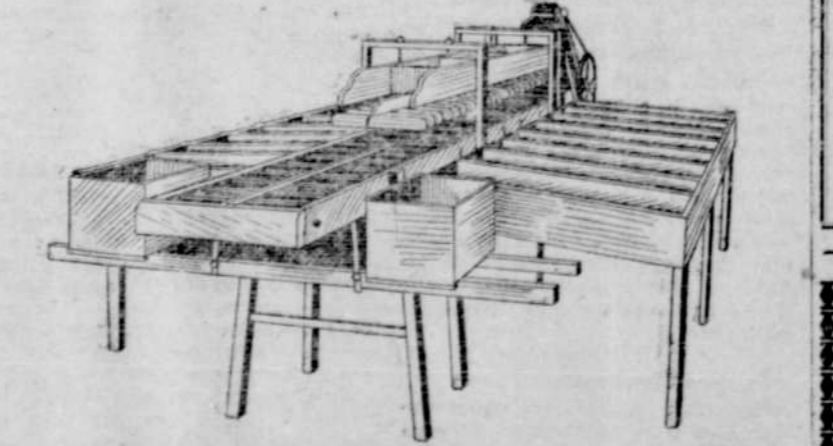
