The body was brought to Mosier on the evening train yesterday and the funeral services were held immediately after in Immanuel Church, conducted by Rev. W. A. Stark, of Hood River. Interment was in Odd Fellows cemetery.
Reese Prather was a native of Illinois. He came to Oregon many years ago and for over 20 years lived on a homestead near Mosier. For the past four years he had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Hunter. He served three years in the Civil War and was with Gen. Sherman when he made his famous march to the sea.
He is survived by four children, Charles, and Andrew Prather and Mrs. Wm. Hunter, of Wren, and Mrs. W. E. Huskey, of Mosier.
