DIES FROM DRINKING CARBOLIC ACID

On Friday afternoon last, Jul-
ius, the two-year-old son of Mr.
and Mrs. J. P. Erhart, climbed
onto a chair and reached a bottle
containing carbolic acid that
stood on a dresser, and which he
evidently thought was Castoria.
Before he was noticed he had
swallowed a portion of the acid.
His cries attracted the attention
of the members of the family
and he was taken at once to Dr.
Robinson's office, where restora-
tives were quickly administered.
The little fellow became uncon-
scious almost immediately after
the accident. Dr. Waugh, of
Hood River, was called in con-
sultation and it was decided to
take the child to a Portland hos-
pital. Accordingly train No. 17
was flagged and the two doctors,
with Mrs. Erhart and her sister,
Miss Lorene Dunsmore, started
to Portland with him.

The poison, however, had so
thoroughly permeated the boy's
system that medical skill was of
no avail and death occurred just
as the train was entering Port-
land.

The little body was brought
back to Mosier Saturday and the
funeral services were held in
Immanuel Church Sunday fore-
noon. Rev. Mr. Hargreaves, of
Hood River, conducting the ser-
vices. The little casket was
covered with beautiful floral
tributes of sympathy from nu-
merous relatives and friends.

Mr. Erhart, who has been in
California the past month, did
not get the message which was
telegraphed him immediately af-
ter the accident until 1 o'clock
Sunday afternoon, as he was in
the mountains, 70 miles from the
station. He left at once, walk-
ing thirty miles before he could
get a conveyance to take him to
the railroad. He arrived home
Tuesday forenoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Erhart have the
sincere sympathy of the com-
munity in their bereavement.

Mr. Randolph Vensel, with
his daughter, Miss Mabel, and
nephew, H. W. Vensel, arrived
here last week from Pittsburg,
Pa., to spend a few days with
his sons, E. B. and W. C. Vensel,
and their families. They were
joined two days later by W. W.
Vensel and wife, also of Pitts-
burg. The party left Wednes-
day on their return trip home.

Evangelist Fagan, who is now
holding revival services at the
Christian Church, was born in
New Zealand. He came to Ore-
gon four years ago and is so im-
pressed with our state that he
has just accepted a call to the
pastorate of the Christian Church
at Albany.

NEW STEAMER ON RUN TO THE DALLES

The Portland Journal says that
the placing of the steamer State
of Washington on the run from
Portland to The Dalles completes
the most notable week that the
river steamboat men have had in
years. The operation of the
State of Washington will make
three or possibly four lines oper-
ating from Portland to The
Dalles, the largest number in
years.

The State of Washington is
owned by F. B. Jones, president
of the Willamette & Columbia
River Towing Company, who
traded the tugboat Cruiser and a
sum of money for her a few
weeks ago. Since then she has
been completely overhauled and
placed in shape for the season's
run to The Dalles.

Plans of the new company
call for the steamer to leave
Portland each night at 11 o'clock
and return the next day. She
has excellent passenger accom-
modations and her owners ex-
pect her to become popular as a
night boat. She will operate
from the Taylor Street dock.

Steamboat men are now anx-
iously awaiting the completion
of the interstate commerce com-
mission hearing of the appeal of
the S. P. & S. to be allowed to
operate the steamers Bailey
Gatzert and Dalles City for
another year. Should their re-
quest be denied it is expected
that the sale of the line will be
announced immediately, while
should the request be granted,
the Harkins Transportation Co.
is expected to place steamers on
the run in competition.

TO APPRAISE OLD COURT HOUSE

with a view to disposing of it.
The board consists of J. L. Kel-
ly, of The Dalles, George W.
Johnston, of Dufur and J. N.

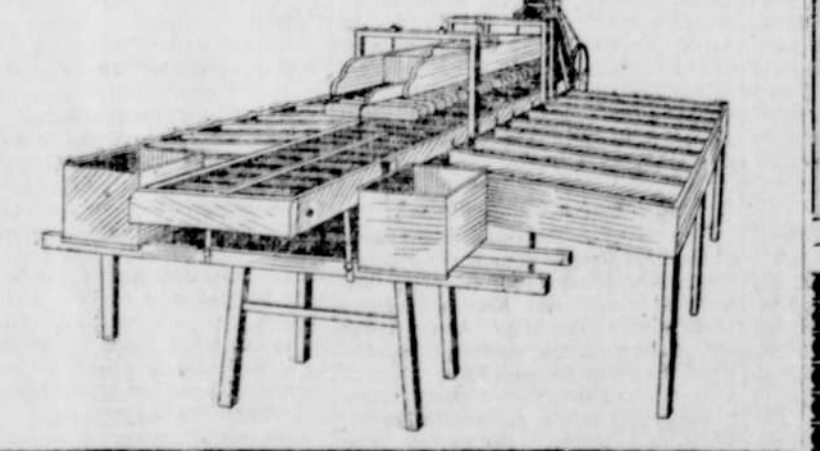
