LINE OF FIRE 25 MILES LONG

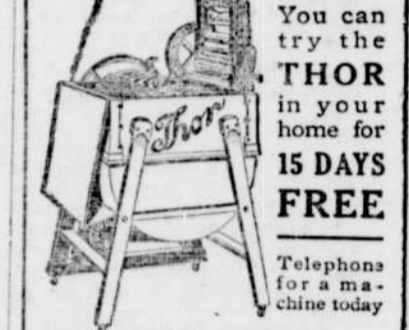
