CITY CHARTER ACCEPTED.

The city charter as referred to the people of Mosier last Saturday was accepted by a vote of 44. There were 55 votes cast, 11 of these being registered as against the charter. Question, Did the eleven read the charter from end to end, or did the 44? Apparently there were a number who either did not read it or were indifferent as to results, for they did not come near the polls. However the charter is accepted and in the main is a good one.

The election passed off very quietly. In fact the day resembled Sunday more than a week day. There was but one of the original appointees on the election board who reported for duty Saturday morning. All the others refused or for some reason failed to serve, so it was necessary to fill their places with other citizens. The eleventh hour judges were, Mrs. P. L. Arthur, Mrs. Virginia Gloyd and W. G. Gloyd; the second clerk was J. T. Davenport.

The Lionite Powder Company, whose plant is on Sauvie's Island, near St. Helens, is breaking into the powder field with big contracts in the Northwest. This comparatively new explosive is being used for the county road work at Astoria, for the greater part of the work on the Columbia highway in Columbia county, being done by the Consolidated Contract Company and also on the Columbia highway in Clatsop county, by the Johnson & Peters Contract Company. The Polson Logging Company of Hoquiam, Wash., the biggest company of the kind in the world, is placing orders by carload lots for the second consecutive year. The Smith Powers Logging Company, which is the biggest in the Coos Bay country, is using Lionite exclusively. Practically all of the logging camps down the Columbia are using the powder. A recent order is for a railroad contract at Doty, Willapa and Fidalde, Wash. - Manufacturers' Journal.

THE DALLES FAIR

For four days this week The Dalles is holding high carnival at the County Fair and Rodeo. The town is full of visitors from all over the county and beyond its borders. Great interest is manifested each year in this event, and though each fair is practically a repetition of the last, there are always some new features in the way of entertainment, and some of the exhibits are better than usual.

Mosier was represented this year in the exhibition booth and stock show. Willie Carroll, the young son of J. M. Carroll, took first prize in the fat stock exhibit for the best pig, getting a blue ribbon for a 7 month's old pig that weighed 209 pounds.

Julian Henningsen received first prize for the best exhibit of corn.

Ora Evans, 11 years old, took first prize for best canned fruit. The prize winners were taken to the Salem State Fair at the expense of the Fair Association.

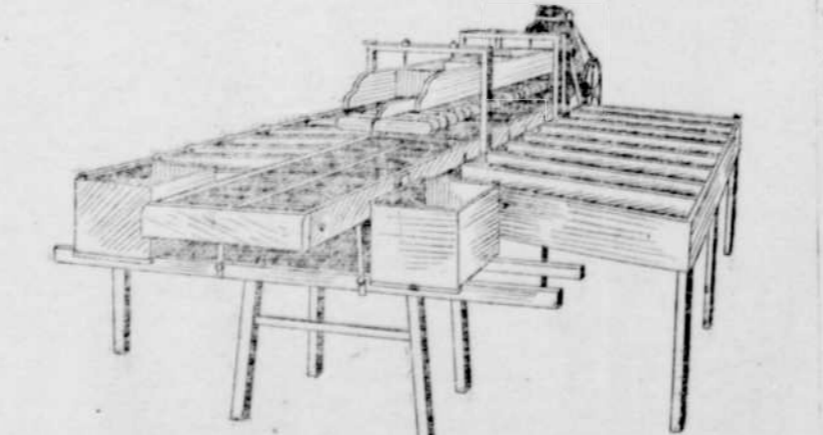
BANKERS HOARDING MONEY

One of the startling disclosures of the week bearing on the prevailing monetary situation throughout the country was the indignant protest voiced by the secretary of the treasury, McAdoo, in charging bankers with hoarding money and refusing loans to legitimate commercial and industrial enterprises. Secretary McAdoo, in an interview handled by the press associations, says that he has received hundreds of protests from all over the country from business men who allege that they are unable to procure the usual loan accommodations from their banks, despite the fact that deposits, as a general rule have increased, and the additional fact that the federal government has recently issued nearly \$500,000,000 of emergency currency, all of which has been deposited with the national banks throughout the country. The secretary of the treasury threatens to withdraw this emergency currency from the banks and intimated that the government might take a hand in the situation to the extent of formulating some plan to make direct treasury loans to merchants and manufacturers.

OREGON WHEAT BEHANCED

European wheat buyers during the past few days, contracted for about 10,000,000 bushels of Oregon and Washington wheat to be delivered at continental and British ports via the Panama canal. The reason, it is asserted, that foreign grain merchants deal directly with the coast is because of the unusual difference in price between Chicago and coast quotations, this difference amounting to about 10 cents a bushel over and above trans-continental freight charges. Portland and Puget Sound grain dealers expect that Europe will purchase most of its American bought grain directly from North Pacific coast dealers.
