COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETS

At a regular meeting of the Commercial Club held Monday night in the Library building, the question of making arrangements for a suitable Mosier exhibit at the Panama Exposition at San Francisco next year, was thoroughly discussed. A committee was appointed to confer with the Fruit Growers Association in regard to securing the choicest of Mosier fruit to be held in cold storage for the occasion. Another committee is to attend to the transportation end.

A plan was outlined by Mr. Kibbee for the publication of an edition descriptive of the town and district. His idea was to furnish an attractive and comprehensive "write-up," setting forth the merits of this section and the opportunities which it has to offer. The book to contain an accurate description of the area of the district, the acreage of orchards, the climatic conditions, value of land, etc.

The object is to get this edition into the hands of some of the many thousands of eastern people who will come west next year. BEFORE they start, to let them read of Mosier, think of Mosier and dream of Mosier, so that Mosier will be their objective point when they start.

A committee was appointed to take the matter up with the promoters of the book, to report at the earliest possible moment, as the book is to be issued soon.

LATIN AMERICAN TRADE

In connection with the opportunity for trade with Latin America, John Barrett, director of the Pan-American Union, has issued a note of caution and warning. What is needed at present he says, is not so much a supply of the manufactured products of the United States, although required in considerable quantities, but money, loans and advances, credits on purchases and markets at reasonable rates for raw products which usually go to Europe. If Latin America can sell at a fair figure her accumulating raw products and buy in turn through receiving financial help and cooperation the situation will be speedily remedied and the commercial interests of the United States and Latin America will truly enter upon a new era of Pan American commerce and comity.

The European war has scrippled Latin American financial resources and commercial machinery that it must require several months or a year before conditions can readjust themselves and permit results that many United States business men expect immediately.

The great opportunity in Latin America is shown by the fact that the twenty countries composing it imported and exported products last year to the value of three billion dollars. Of this amount two billion dollars were transactions with Europe. During the past seven years the trade with the United States has increased from \$450,000,000 to \$850,000,000.

The opportunity of the hour says Mr. Barrett, is not so much one for immediate large sales of United States manufactured products as one for cooperation and mutual help, together with careful investigation of commercial conditions.—Journal.

The European war situation in the opinion of military experts both in this country and in such of those European states as have escaped the severe censorship, indicate that the involved powers are likely to be in a prolonged death struggle. The theory of a short and decisive war now seems to be abandoned, and unless conditions materially change the experts say the contest will be prolonged, but one hazard a guess as to how long.

MOSIER'S FIRST ALARMING FIRE

West's Great Hay Warehouse
Total Loss in Spectacular
Midnight Blaze

ABSENCE OF WIND SAVES THE TOWN

The midnight cry of "FIRE," the ringing of the church bell and the shooting of guns aroused the citizens of Mosier from their beds on Wednesday night to witness a spectacular scene at H. M. West's warehouse on the railroad right of way at the foot of Washington street.

Mrs. W. C. Stone, who lives near by on Washington street, was awakened by the barking of her dog, and on looking out discovered smoke pouring from the building. She at once called S. E. Francisco, who lives next door, and who gave the first alarm. Soon people were running to the scene from all directions. The fire had gained such headway, however, that it was impossible to do anything to save the building, and the crowd confined their efforts to preventing the flames from spreading to nearby buildings. The chemical engine was brought down but was useless as far as the main fire was concerned, and the stream was played on the surrounding piles of wood.

The origin of the fire is only guess work, but it is supposed that it was started, probably accidentally, by some "blanket men" who camped close to the warehouse. While it is thought by some that the fire was incendiary, one fact would tend to contradict this theory. That is that the fire hydrant at the back of the building was found partly open and water running, which lends color to the supposition that when the men discovered the fire they made an effort to put it out, but finding that the fire was gaining headway, became frightened and fled, fearing arrest and the charge of incendiarism. Two men were seen by Mr. Butterfield, night watchman at the crusher, hurrying out of town towards Hood River and talking excitedly in a foreign tongue. It is probably these men who are responsible for the blaze.

The loss is estimated at \$6000, with insurance of \$3000. Those who sustained losses were, besides Mr. West, E. M. Strauss, who had a carload of flour stored in the warehouse; M. A. Mayer, about a hundred boxes of apples; Ernest Jacobsen, carload of hay; Coleman ranch, several tons of hay; A. P. Bateman, personal effects; J. B. Breneman, personal effects.

The need of fire protection is startlingly illustrated by this disastrous blaze, and the question of such protection will no doubt be seriously considered by the city authorities. Kind Providence certainly favored Mosier Wednesday night in that there was no wind. Had it been blowing from the west as hard as it often blows here, the town would now be a desolate waste, for nothing could have stopped the flames from spreading over the entire town.

Mr. West is unable to state what his plans for the future will be until the losses have been adjusted.

This disaster has taught the people of Mosier that some precaution should be taken against fire or allowing rubbish to accumulate where there is any possible danger of ignition.

The enterprise will be financed by the sale of space in the magazine, affording an opportunity for all to contribute to the production, which will be for both the individual and public benefit.

Moves are now being made by cities and public bodies all over the coast country to get something into print before next year, when the rush to the coast will be greater than ever before. The railroad has recently issued a beautiful booklet to induce travel by the Columbia river routes—which brings people in touch with Mosier, and it seems up to this locality to do something to induce travelers to stop here and "take a look" at the greatest country out of doors.

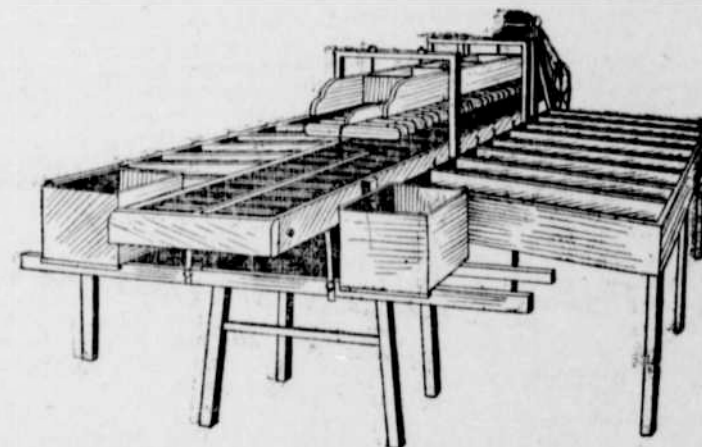
