MOSIER OREGON

PROCLAMATION

KNOW YE, That whereas, at a special election called and held in the City of Mosier, on the 23rd day of September, 1914, for the purpose of voting on the adoption or rejection of the proposed charter of the City of Mosier, the same being proposed and submitted to the people of the City of Mosier by the Common Council thereof, by Resolution "A" duly and regularly adopted by said Council on the 9th day of September, 1914, and being entitled, "An Ordinance to Provide a Charter for the City of Mosier, and to Define its Powers;"

AND WHEREAS, at the said election so called and held, there were cast a total number of 55 votes, of which number 44 votes were cast in the affirmative in favor of the adoption of said measure, and 11 votes were cast in the negative and opposed to the adoption of said measure.

AND WHEREAS, the Mayor and Recorder have duly and regularly filed their certificate of the canvass of said vote showing the result thereof in the presence of the Common Council at its next regular meeting, to-wit: the 14th day of October, 1914;

AND WHEREAS, it appearing that said measure was at said election adopted by a majority vote of the electors of the City of Mosier, voting thereon;

Now THEREFORE, by virtue of my office and the power conferred upon me by law, I do hereby proclaim that said measure submitted to the people of the City of Mosier at said election on the 23rd day of September, 1914, by Resolution "A" of the Common Council of said city, adopted the 9th day of September, 1914, said measure being entitled, "An Ordinance to Provide a Charter for the City of Mosier, and to Define its Powers," to be in full force and effect in the City of Mosier, Oregon, from and after the date of this, my Proclamation.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the City of Mosier to be affixed this 14th day of October, 1914.

Ordinance No. 8

An Ordinance Providing for Holding and Conducting of City Elections.

The City of Mosier does Ordain as follows: SECTION 1. All the territory embraced within the corporate limits of the city of Mosier, shall be one ward and shall have one voting or polling place for each election.

SEC. 2. At its regular meeting in November of each year, the Common Council shall designate the place for holding the annual election, and shall appoint three (3) judges and two (2) clerks of election who shall receive such compensation as the Council may prescribe.

SEC. 3. The Recorder, under the direction of the Council, shall give (10) days' notice of each general election by publishing a notice thereof for said time in some newspaper published in the city of Mosier, Oregon, which notice shall contain a list of the officers to be elected thereat, the place for holding the election, and the names of the judges and clerks appointed to conduct the same.

SEC. 4. All candidates or nominees for any office shall file, or cause to be filed with the recorder not less than five days prior to the day of election, a certificate of nomination signed by not less than five qualified electors of the town. Prior to the day of election the Recorder shall prepare the ballots and cause them to be printed as required by the general election laws of the State of Oregon, and shall provide one ballot box, the poll book, tally sheets, stationery and other articles necessary for conducting said election according to the laws of Oregon, and shall deliver the same to the judges of election at the time of opening the polls for election.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the marshal to secure the use of the place designated by the Council for a polling place, and shall cause the same to be suitably provided for election according to the laws of Oregon.

SEC. 6. The returns of the election shall be filed with the Recorder immediately after they shall have been completed; the Common Council shall canvass the returns of said election at its next regular meeting thereafter. A written statement of the canvass shall be made and signed by the Mayor and Recorder, and filed with the Recorder, which must contain the whole number of votes given at such election, the number given for each candidate for office and the names of the persons elected, and to what office as determined by a majority of the Council. The persons receiving respectively the highest number of votes for the several offices to be filled shall be declared duly elected to said offices. Provided, that in case of a tie vote between candidates, or of a contest, the Council shall determine the same according to the general election laws of the State of Oregon.

SEC. 7. Immediately after the completion of the canvass, the Recorder must make and sign a certificate of election for each person declared thereby to be elected, and deliver the same to him on demand.

SEC. 8. Inasmuch as the charter of the City of Mosier provides for the holding of the annual election on the first Tuesday in December, and inasmuch as no procedure has been adopted for the holding of such election by the Council, and inasmuch as the time for the passage of such Ordinance, before election is limited, in the opinion of the Council an emergency exists and it hereby declares that the measure is the opinion of the Council necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace and safety of the citizens of Mosier.

Therefore, this Ordinance shall go in, to force and effect immediately upon its final passage and approval by the Mayor.

Passed the Common Council this 14th day of October, 1914.

APPLE DAY

October 20 is Apple day. On that auspicious occasion Portland expects every man, and in particular every woman, to do their duty. What is that duty? Why to buy at least one box of apples, and as many more as purse and appetite suggest.

The housewife who buys a box of apples on apple day will confer a double benefit. The first and greater part of the good she does will accrue to herself and her family, for she who secures a box of delicious apples has something better than rubies and far preferable to fine gold.

In the second place she will confer a benefit upon the grower for this fall, owing to the closing of markets by the war, it is not an easy task for him to dispose of his delicious product.

Of course everybody in the land would eat Oregon apples if he understood what he is losing by eating anything else. But unhappily this knowledge is not so widely spread as it ought to be. The noble patriots who are promoting apple day have undertaken to bring home the merits of Oregon's unparalleled fruit to every person in the city on October 20. Of course they hope and believe that the effect of their grand missionary work will not be transient.

To make every citizen of Portland buy a box of apples on October 20 would indeed be an enviable triumph but it would not permanently relieve a congested market. The expectation is that once the buying habit is begun it will continue. "Perseverance" is to be the universal watchword. The Oregon apple is so delectable that no one who once procures a box is ever likely to be without a supply henceforth, so long as the crop holds out. Let everybody take part in the observance of Apple day and thus make glad their own hearts and the hearts of the deserving growers at the same time.—Oregonian.

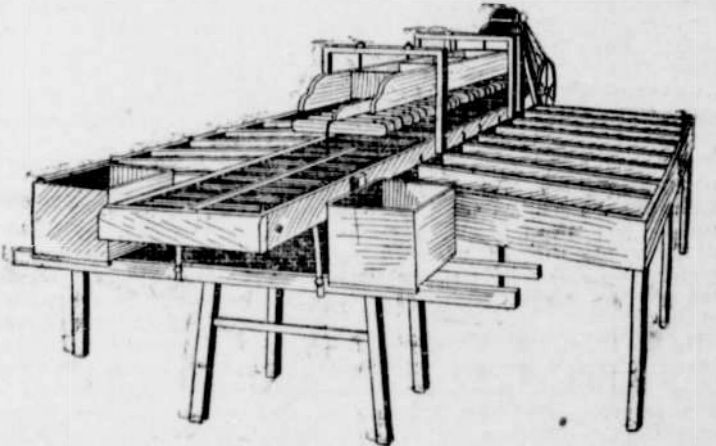
