THE RURAL PRESS

The Local Paper a Most Useful
Agency on the Farm—The Press,
Pulpit and School a Trinity of
Influence That Must Be
Utilized in Building
Agriculture.

A broad campaign of publicity on
the subject of rural life is needed in
this state today to bring the problems
of the farmers to the forefront. The
city problems are blazoned upon the
front pages of the metropolitan dailies
and echoed in the country press, but
the troubles of the farmers are
seldom told, except by those who
seek to profit by the story, and the
glitter of the package oftentimes ob-
scures the substance. A searching in-
vestigation into the needs of the
farmers will reveal many inherent
defects in our economic system that
can be easily remedied when properly
understood and illuminated by the power
of the press.

The rural press, the pulpit and the
school are a trinity of powerful in-
fluences that the farmer must utilize
to their fullest capacity before he can
occupy a commanding position in public
affairs. These agencies are
organized in every rural community
and only await the patronage and co-
operation of the farmers to fully de-
velop their energy and usefulness. They
are local forces working for the
best interests of their respective
communities. Their work is to build
and their object is to serve. They
prosper only through the development
and prosperity of the community.

Every farmer in this state should
subscribe for the local paper, as well
as farm periodicals and such other
publications as he may find profitable,
but he should, by all means, subscribe
for his local paper, and no home
should be without it. The local paper
is part of the community life and the
editor understands the farmer's prob-
lems. It is the local press that will
study the local problems and through
its columns deal with subjects of most
vital importance to local life of the
community.

A Noble Task.

In too many instances the country
papers mimic the city press by giv-
ing prominence to scandals, accidents
and political agitation. The new rural
civilization has placed upon the
rural press renewed responsibilities,
and enlarged possibilities for useful-
ness. It cannot perform its mission
to agriculture by recording the frailties,
the mishaps and inordinate ambi-
tions of humanity, or by filling its
columns with the echoes of the strug-
gles of busy streets, or by enchanting
stories of city life which lure our
children from the farm.

It has a higher and nobler task.
Too often the pages of the city dailies
bristle with the struggle of ambitious
men in their wild lust for power, and
many times the flames of personal
conflict sear the tender buds of new
civilization and illuminate the path-
way to destruction. The rural press
is the governing power of public senti-
ment and must hold steadfast to
principle and keep the ship of state
on the roadstead of progress. The
rural press can best serve the inter-
ests of the farmers by applying its
energies to the solution of problems
affecting the local community. It
must stem the mighty life current
that is moving from the farm to the
cities, sweeping before it a thousand
boys and girls per day. It has to deal
with the fundamental problems of
civilization at their fountain head. Its
mission is to direct growth, teach ef-
ficiency and mold the intellectual life
of the country, placing before the pub-
lic the daily problems of the farmers
and giving first attention to the so-
ciative, co-operative, educational and
social needs of the agricultural classes
within its respective community.

The Power of Advertising.

The influence of advertising is clearly
visible in the homes and habits of
the farmers, and the advertising col-
umns of the press are making their
imprint upon the lives of our people.
The farmer possesses the things that
are best advertised.

The farmer is entitled to all the
advantages and deserves all the lux-
uries of life. We need more art, sci-
ence and useful facilities on the
farms, and many homes and farms
are well balanced in this respect, but
the advertiser can render a service
by teaching the advantages of modern
equipment throughout the columns of
the rural press.

The farmers are in need of person-
al leadership. They have political lead-
ers, but they need local industrial
community and educational leaders.
