YEAR'S APPLE CROP BIGGEST IN HISTORY

This year's apple crop was the largest ever produced in the United States. Estimates announced recently by the Department of Agriculture placed the 1914 yield at 259,000,000 bushels, or 114,000,000 more than was produced last year.

These figures represent the actual "agricultural yield", the Department explained, and should not be confused with those of the commercial crop, which comprises the marketed portion of the total production. In 1913 the commercial crop was estimated at 40 per cent of the agricultural production. Using the same proportion for the 1914 basis, this year's commercial crop would total 103,600,000 bushels.

The states leading in production of apples this year were: New York, 49,600,000 bushels; Pennsylvania, 23,100,000; Michigan, 17,200,000; Virginia, 15,300,000; Kentucky, 14,700,000; Ohio, 13,300,000; Missouri, 12,500,000; West Virginia, 12,400,000; North Carolina, 9,000,000; Tennessee, 8,600,000; and Washington, 8,300,000.—Hood River 8,300,000.

COLUMBIA HOSPITAL OPENED YESTERDAY

An important event in The Dalles was the formal opening yesterday, of the Columbia Hospital. This institution is conducted by three well-known and eminent physicians, Dr. M. E. Corbin, an expert in obstetrics and diseases of women; Dr. Geo. L. Cousineau, a prominent surgeon, and Dr. Harvard Moore, who attends to the general practice.

The Columbia Hospital is pleasantly located at the corner of 10th and Union streets, and is a three-story and basement building. It was built for hospital purposes seven years ago by Drs. Geisendorfer and Lowe. After the former's death it was closed until the present staff opened it last September. In October a fire destroyed part of the structure and it has since been practically closed for repairs. The entire building has been remodeled and the rooms, of which there are 48, are beautifully furnished in hard wood and attractive coloring. The building will accommodate 60 patients. In the male ward there is room for ten beds, the female ward holding six. The maternity ward is fitted up with every convenience.

The basement contains the dining room, kitchen, laundry and store room. The upper floors are devoted to the patients, the living rooms for the staff, and five nurses and the surgery. The latter is the pride of the institution, containing the latest improved Bramhall Sterilizer and all other up-to-date appliances. In fact, the entire building is perfect in its appointments and an inspection of the Columbia Hospital would give anyone needing the services of such an institution a feeling of security and confidence in the integrity of the entire staff, and their ability to furnish the best possible medical and surgical service. The building is well protected against fire by six fire reels with a pressure sufficient to rip the shingles from the roof. The hospital ambulance will meet all out-of-town patients, upon notification.

The Dalles is fortunate in having such a modern hospital, where its citizens, as well as all others within reach of it can have the best service that medical and surgical skill can provide, and the public is cordially invited to call and inspect it at any time.

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WHAT DID IT COST YOU?

Last Saturday's meeting of the Horticultural Society was the best meeting so far this winter in points of attendance and instruction received. Dr. Robinson, by the use of a blackboard, showed some very enlightening figures from which the following have been taken.

It cost Hood River Growers .3656 cents to market their apples from the tree to the warehouse. It cost Mosier Growers .3656 cents to market theirs. The Mosier figure is the average of costs to local growers from a census taken during the meeting and includes the estimates of the best orchardists of Mosier.

Figures were produced showing conclusively that it pays to gather elders. The meeting uncovered a local disciplinarian of figures in the person of John Carroll who caught some of them telling lies. Next Saturday January 23, 1915, Mr. Birkner will head the discussion on winter spraying while summer spraying will be started by Mr. Duncan of the Sherwin-Williams Company.
