The question of a 1-mill levy for good roads, in the form of a bill to be presented to our legislature, will come up for discussion shortly. We are glad to note that the majority of the people along the Columbia and particularly in this section, are heartily in favor of the bill. They realize the great importance of the highway and good roads in general.
